About Financial Empowerment Center

The Financial Empowerment Center is a program of the Mayor's Office operated in partnership with The United Way of Metropolitan Nashville. The program has been funded for three years (2013 – 2015) by the Cities for Financial Empowerment Fund through support from Bloomberg Philanthropies. Nashville was one of five cities chosen to replicate the evidence-based Financial Empowerment Center model, which began in New York City in 2008. The other four replication cities are Lansing, San Antonio, Denver and Philadelphia.

The Center provides free, professional one-on-one financial counseling to residents of Davidson County, integrating financial counseling with core social services, such as workforce development, homelessness prevention, utility and rent assistance, Head Start, and public housing. Financial counseling is focused on banking, credit, debt and savings. Quantified, measurable outcomes are tracked for each service plan.

From March 2013 to March 1, 2015 the Center's counselors have delivered over 8100 personal financial counseling sessions to over 2800 clients in Davidson County. Clients in Nashville have reduced their debt overall by over \$1,500,000 working with the program. They have increased their overall savings by over \$300,000.

Each client's financial progress and goals are tracked in a software program called Efforts to Outcomes (ETO). More program details, site locations, and news stories can be found at http://fec.nashville.gov
