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



The Times Spotlight: Joanne Mills TECPAC Graduate

Joanne Mills of Louden County, Tennessee was part of the 2008 inaugural TECPAC class instructed by Mrs. Saundra Stiles at Roane State Community College. Ms. Mills, having been in the field of child care for over thirty years, initiated her career as a director at Baptist Child Care Center in Lenoir City, Tennessee. This was a unique child care program established for employees of Baptist Health Care Center. It was part of a multi-generational model, as it was housed with a nursing facility.

Ms. Mills recalls her mindset after she completed her Child Development Associate (CDA) Credential, as she thought there should be something for directors. TECPAC became an option and she excitedly "took it!" She remembers the hard work, but more so remembers the skills she gained. She learned how to develop and obtain community resources, and how to properly implement parent engagement activities. The Program Administration Scale was "a good rating scale. It became obvious what you were weak in and what you did well." She remembered learning about her staff's personalities, and how their personalities fit with hers. And, her favorite part of the process was networking with other administrators. She said, "Hearing the perspective of others helped."

Ms. Mills' motivation for learning was turned on, and in 2011 she completed her Associate Degree in Early Childhood Education. She has renewed her Credential twice, which means that despite not pursuing a degree she took college coursework for the most recent renewal in 2016. She is still open to pursuing her Bachelors degree.

So what is Ms. Mills doing today? Early in 2015 Ms. Mills was made aware of the imminent closure of Baptist Child Care Center, so she got busy and found a building to open a child care program. She felt it was imperative that the parents had a place to bring their children, and the faithful and competent staff needed somewhere to continue to care for the children. Her additional focus was the county's need for infant and toddler slots, as Louden

County does not have many child care programs with infant and toddler care. Her passion and persistence resulted in Jo's Kids: Innovative Discovery School located at 100 Robinson Drive, Lenoir City, Tennessee. The Baptist Child Care Center officially closed on May 29, 2015, and Jo's Kids opened on June 1, 2015. Now she is responsible for so much more, because she no longer has the health care facility to fall back on for everyday things like maintenance. She stated that she is "still getting kinks ironed out." However, she is thrilled to have the opportunity to serve the families of Louden County.

"I recommend the TECPAC program as something you do before you take on the duties of an administrator, like student teaching." These words from Ms. Mills reveals the significant knowledge, skills, abilities and competencies gained during the TECPAC process. She feels fulfilling the duties of an administrator is a calling. Her advice for administrators: "There will be rough days – don't let the little things get to you. And, get a routine and schedule for you and your staff – know what to expect."

Ms. Mills' noticeably reaped the benefits from the time she dedicated to TECPAC. She acquired skills and resources that had a positive effect on her professional life, as well as the staff, children, and families she has touched and continues to touch. Most importantly, she became part of a network of administrators with two things in common; they are lifelong learners, and are dedicated to the provision of quality services to the children and families of their programs. Her recommendation of the TECPAC process for others also articulates it as a beneficial experience that administrators should undertake!


More Educational Opportunities with Technology
