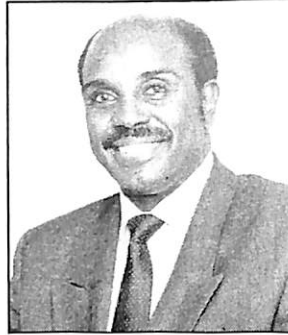

Gerald L. Durley

Commencement Speaker

Gerald L. Durley is the senior pastor of the historic Providence Missionary Baptist Church of Atlanta, Ga., and a 1964 graduate of Tennessee State University. In addition to his work with the church, Durley also serves as chaplain with the Atlanta Police Chaplaincy Corps and director of the Health Promotion Resource Center, which helps fund health prevention programs throughout the Southeast. He also works as co-director of the Atlanta Interfaith Health Project, affiliated with The Carter Center, an organization established by former U.S. President Jimmy Carter.



Prior to joining the pastorate, Durley served as executive director of the Head Start Program in Fulton and Douglas Counties in Georgia, and as director of community relations and dean of students with Clark Atlanta University.

Dr. James Hefner, president of Tennessee State University, said, "Tennessee State University traditionally asks a distinguished graduate of the University to deliver the summer commencement address. We are pleased to have Pastor Gerald Durley who has devoted his life to serving others, both physically and spiritually, to be our speaker this year. We believe his contributions to society will be an inspiration to this year's graduates as they, too, begin to serve in their careers."



Facts About *Tennessee State University*

- ♦ The University was recently listed among the best educational institutions in the United States, according to U.S. News and World Report's 1995 Guide to America's Best Colleges.
- ♦ Tennessee State University is the only institution in the Tennessee Board of Regents system that showed an increase in enrollment during the fall 1994 term. Fall enrollment at TSU was 8,180 full-time students. Student enrollment for the 1993 fall term was 7,851.
- ♦ Less than 21 percent of all colleges in the United States have accredited business programs. TSU is one of these colleges and the only college in Nashville accredited at both the undergraduate and graduate levels by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business.
- ♦ The University has one of the largest schools of Allied Health in the nation. The school has eight programs designed to prepare students for exploding career opportunities in the health care field. A new master's degree program in nursing began operation in the fall semester.
- ♦ One of the nation's most prestigious honors societies, Phi Kappa Phi, now offers a chapter at Tennessee State University, the only chapter in Nashville.
- ♦ Tennessee State University houses The First Chair of Excellence in the College of Business, funded in part by the State of Tennessee, and a Chair of Environmental Engineering, funded by the Office of Naval Research.
- ♦ The University's \$112 million capital construction campaign is allowing TSU to construct eight new buildings and renovate virtually every existing building on campus by the mid-1990s.
- ♦ The University recently completed the first building phase of the \$3.4 million Otis L. Floyd Nursery Crops Research Station in McMinnville, Tennessee.
- ♦ The College of Engineering and Technology is bringing the latest research discoveries right into the classroom this year as the college teams with NASA to introduce students to better ways of designing structures.
- ♦ In addition to its academic achievements, Tennessee State University has a distinguished athletic tradition in football, basketball and track. The University is third in the nation, over a 30-year period, in winning football percentage. TSU has won three national basketball championships and has had 40 athletes to compete in the Olympics, winning a combined total of 23 medals -- 13 gold, 6 silver and 4 bronze.
- ♦ The University's track team, the famed Tigerbelles, has won 13 Olympic gold medals, more than most countries have won.
- ♦ The University's Aristocrat of Bands is one of the most distinguished college bands in the world. It is the only college band to perform for two United States presidential inaugurations.
- ♦ The University offers 42 baccalaureate degrees and 21 master's degrees. Doctoral programs are offered in four areas: public administration, administration and supervision, curriculum and instruction, and psychology.

The Campus

The University has two convenient campus sites: Its central or main campus is located between 28th and 39th Avenues North and is bounded by the Cumberland River on the North and Albion Street on the South. The main campus occupies more than 450 acres with 65 buildings, parking lots, outdoor facilities, pasture and farm lands.

The Avon N. Williams, Jr. campus is located at Tenth and Charlotte Avenues, in downtown Nashville, with adjacent parking facilities. The “downtown campus” is the site for the Center of Excellence for Research in Basic Skills, Center of Excellence Information Systems Engineering and Management, the Center of Extended Education and Public Service, the Center for Labor-Management Relations, the Institute of Government, the Testing Center and Departmental offices of the College of Business.

Other facilities include faculty offices, classrooms, lecture halls, computer laboratories, library and a 200-seat auditorium. Daytime and evening classes are available at the Williams campus.
