THROUGH THE YEARS AT TENNESSEE STATE

When the spotlight is focused on the rise of a nation, state or institution, only a small portion of its facets are illuminated. Spotlighting Tennessee Agricultural and Industrial State University's progress creates the identical problem of saying what is progress, where it begins and the points or sign-posts that, of themselves, symbolize the measure for that progress.

From an individual point of view, one can take issue with the importance of the events, but history has recorded that they occur, that they have occurred, and that they have shaped the direction of this great University.

Through the years at Tennessee State evidence of what we term progress—50 years of progress—has projected itself. Some of that projection of progress is presented here for your perusal with the thought that fond memories of the past and bright visions of the future of Alma Mater might be just "what the doctor ordered."

And while you while away the hours with your copy of this pictorial memory book, feel pride in the fact that YOUR University, Tennessee Agricultural and Industrial State University at Nashville, has made tremendous strides, both academically and athletically in her 50 year history. The activities of her past are your prideful heritage and represent your touchstones for the future.





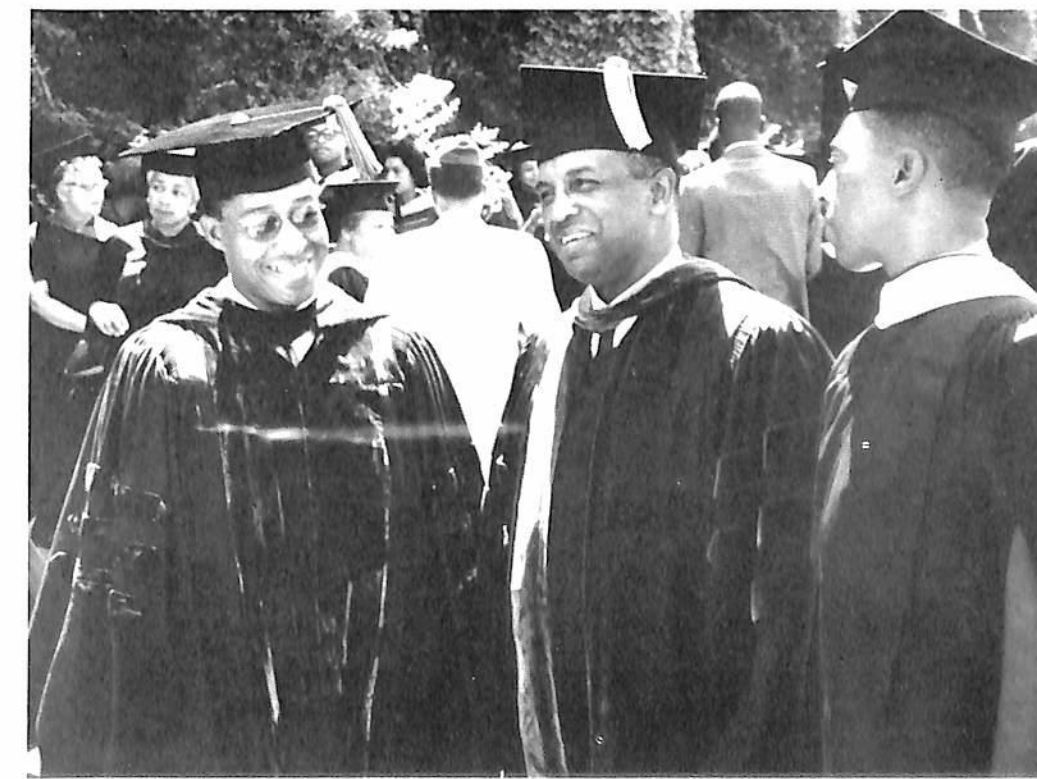
Posing all the present-day doctoral degree holders of our faculty on the Administration Building steps as was done in the Summer of '49 would present a picture resembling a Kentucky Derby infield wire-hugging scene. This—just fifty years after the very beginning at which time it could not be done at all for the simple reason that there were no doctoral degree holders to pose.

Opening its doors on June 19, 1912 with its founder, William J. Hale, as first president, Tennessee State Normal School for Negroes began its sometimes hazardous, oft-times arduous trek toward full-fledged land-grantism and enough faculty members to meet the needs of whatever enrollment figures appeared on the books during a given era. This figure had jumped from a mere handful in 1912 to 1,256 by the time the present administration took over in 1943 and the rest of the statistical picture on the now Tennessee State College campus looked something like this: Physical plant valued at \$3,500,000, 28 buildings, 35 faculty members. Today: physical plant \$16 millions, 36 buildings, 220 faculty members.

By 1943 members of the community were used to seeing buildings on the South side of the campus as well as on the North side where the college sported its original holdings. The South side wilderness had been cleared during the thirties and buildings erected there considered modern, well-equipped, and more than adequate.

Faculty members taught in pleasant surroundings and herded their students to chapel in the fancy new auditorium whenever the chapel bell sounded.

Administration and Faculty



Too many chapel cuts back in the "good ole days" which incidentally would not be considered the "good ole days" in a school of more maturity) constituted something close to a felony. A seating arrangement had to be arranged and noses had to be counted or accounted for.

Tennessee State made its mark with its Players Guild productions as far back as the thirties, with the forties, fifties and sixties seeing the creation of more on-stage glamour at the hands of highly unseasoned artists with other cultural tid-bits brought in from the outside and introduced into campus life early in the game.

In the meantime boys would be boys as boys will be boys and the male of the species at State ran the gamut from striped blazer dandies, to gold fish-swallowers, to phone booth-stuffers, to sports-car buffoons.



Campus Life

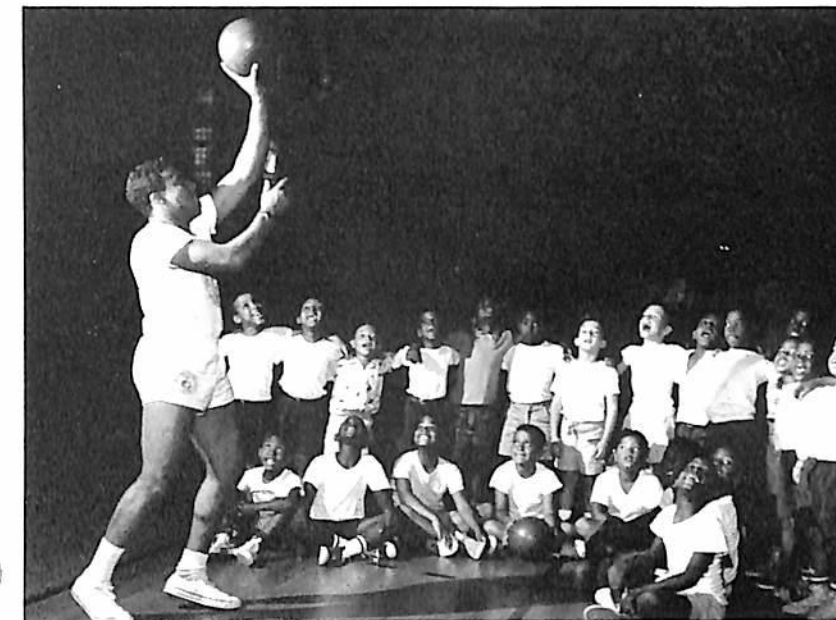
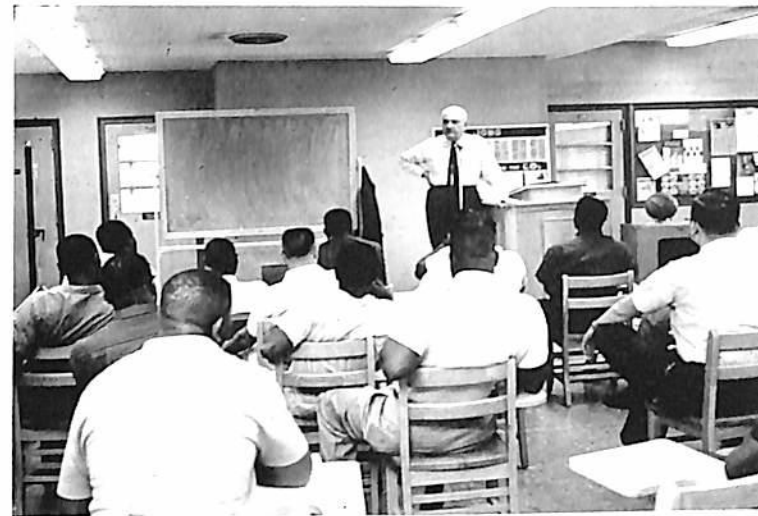




From the time the doors opened at State Normal until now there have been those who wanted a look-see at the campus on the hill.

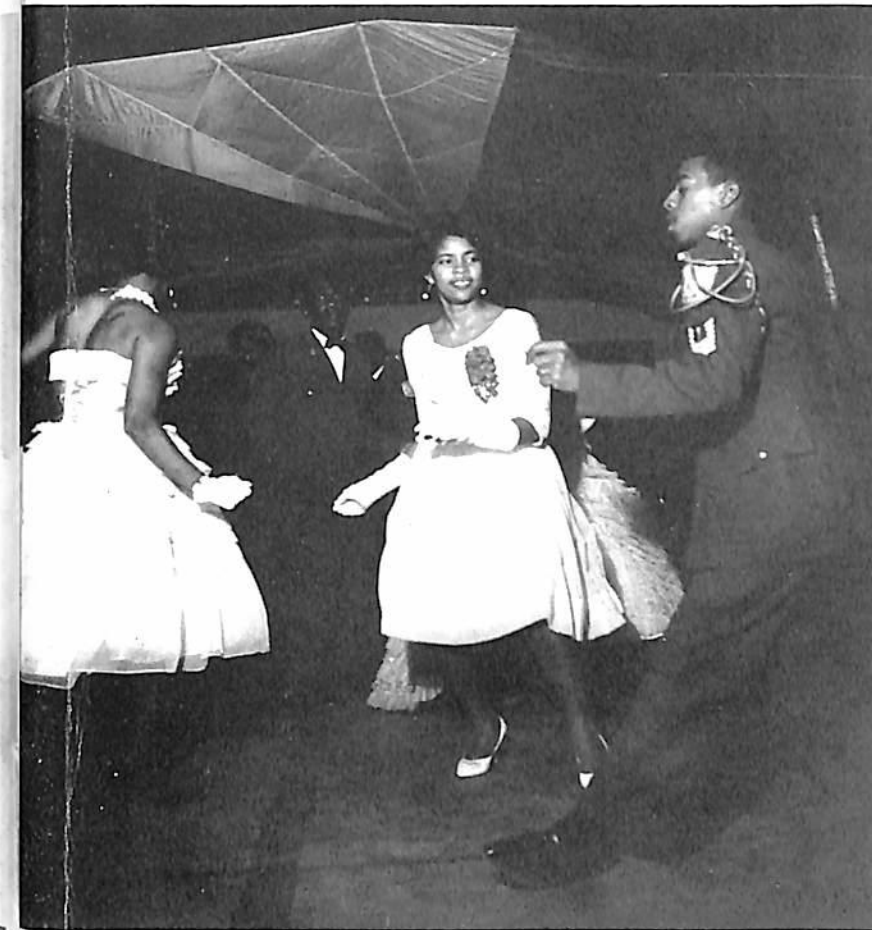




Seems like everything started happening in the thirties because that's when big bands came into prominence and folks on the campus got used to the idea of having a big band on hand.

The big band idea sweeping the nation in the thirties and into the forties swept Tennessee State. Names started cropping up—names to remember such as: "Don Q.," "Chick" Chavis, "Chesty Red" Covington, "Sonny" Turner and you could go on and on. The Tennessee State Collegians went on and on going big time with every step, winning Nation-wide college band polls and in demand. Uncle Sam broke up the band and later years found name bands and combos imported for Tennessee State's college proms.





In the beginning, Tennessee State girls, toggled in long skirts did the two-step with their partners. Short-skirted campus coquettes charlestoned in the twenties. Skirts came down a peg and went up again and girls liked to "ball-room" as well as jitterbug in the thirties. Jitterbugging lasted into the forties but short skirts did not and Tennessee State's bobby-soxers adopted the "New look" of skirts at ankle length. Calf-length skirts came into being in the fifties along with rock 'n roll with the guys and gals doing something they dubbed "bop."

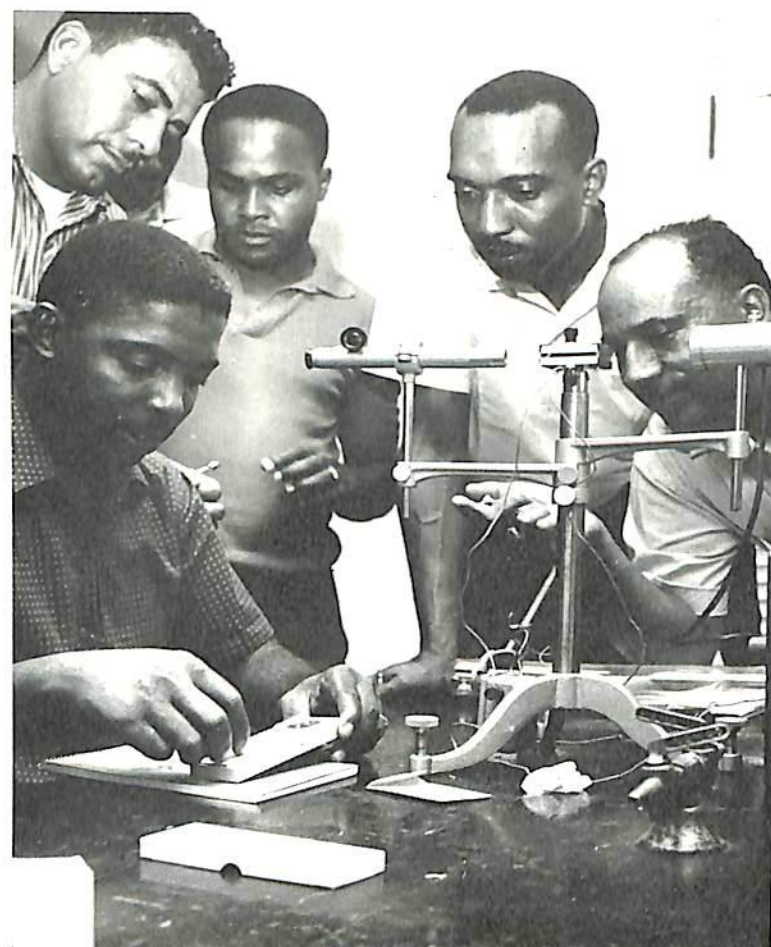
Now back to knee-length skirts, Tennessee State's gang is twistin' with the best of them.

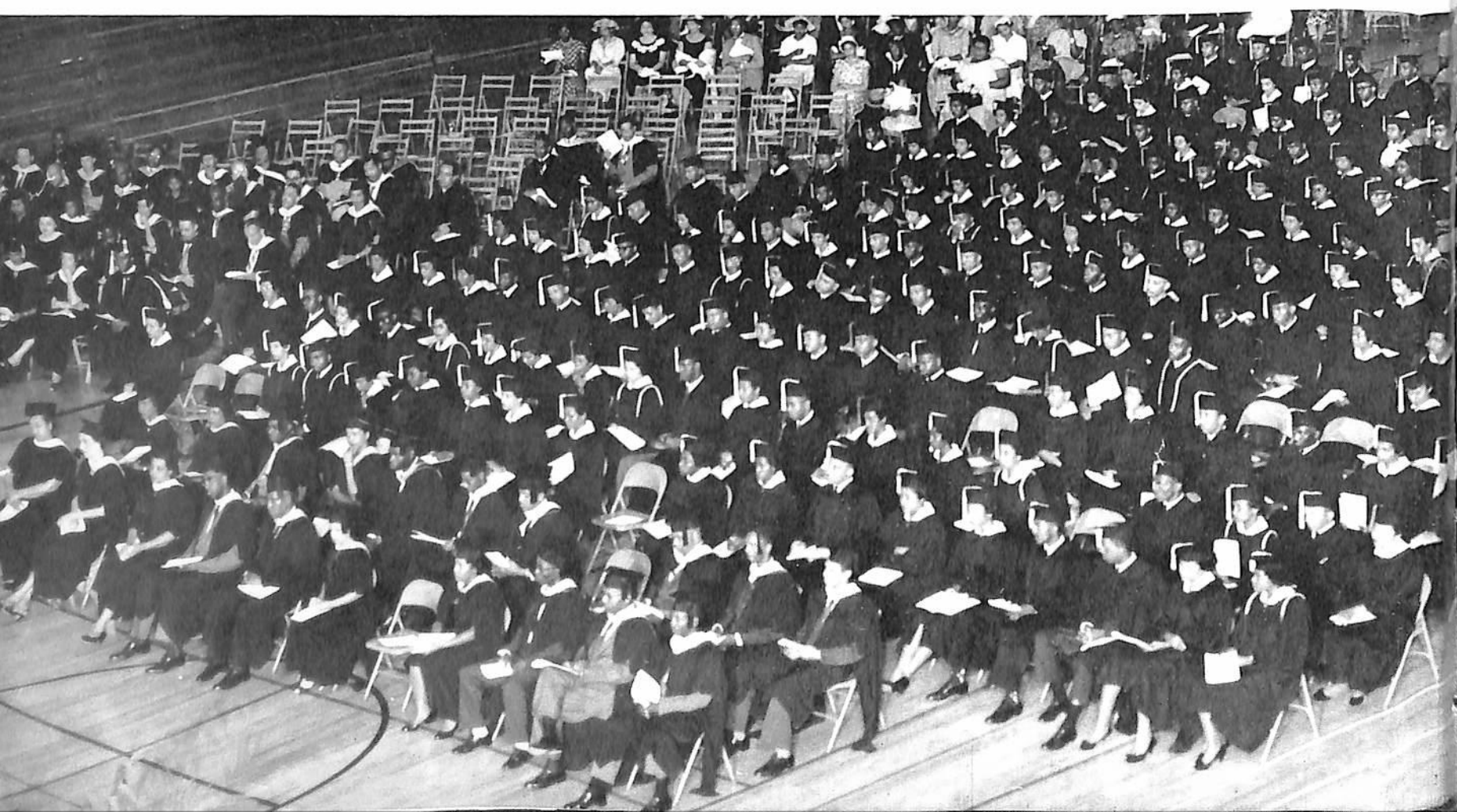
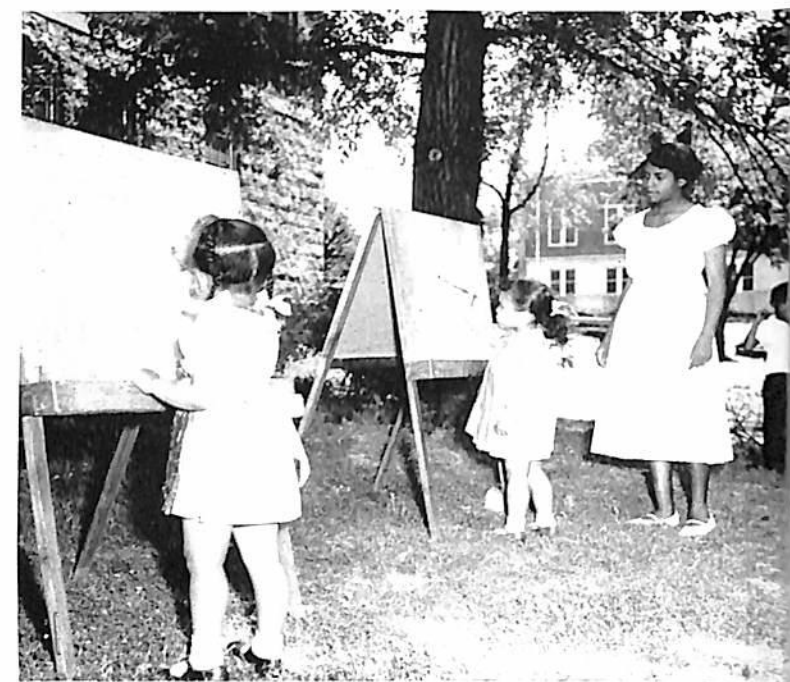

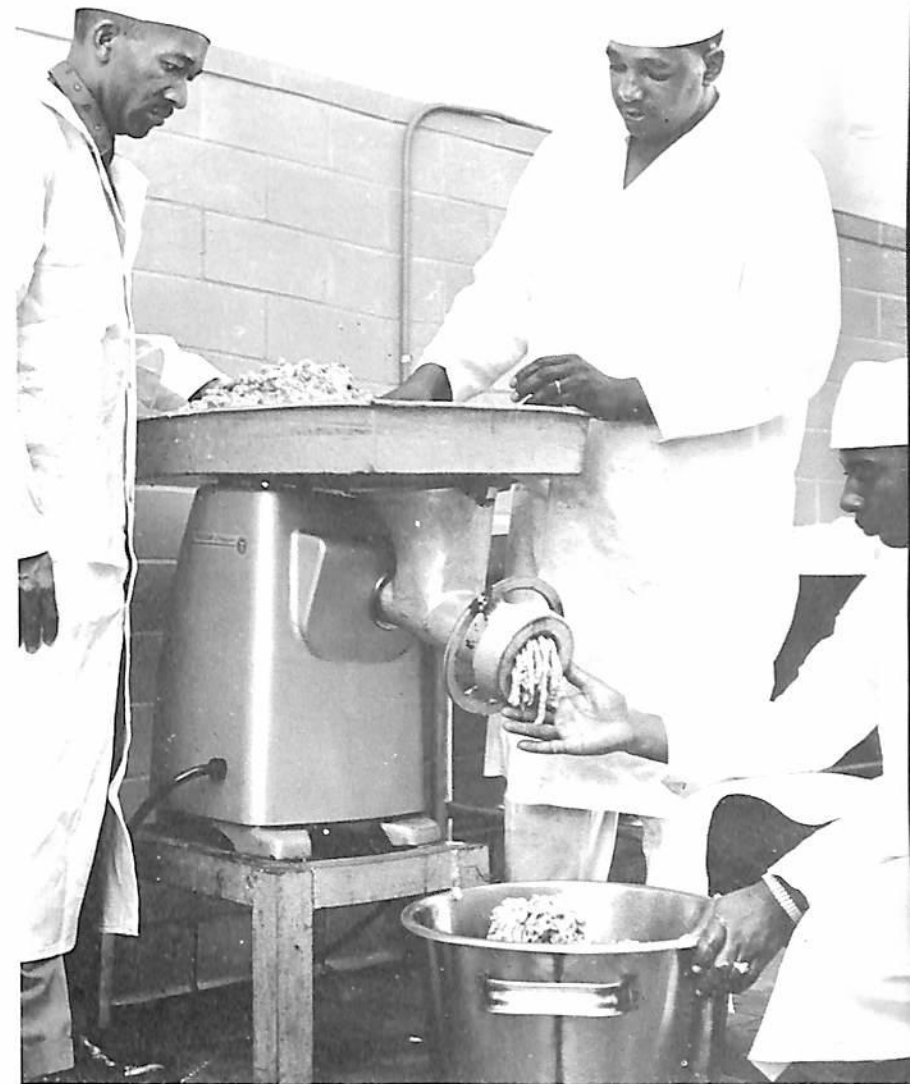

Academics





Milestones and highlighting events have been the order of the day at Tennessee State. 1924 marked the date of the first graduating class from the four-year college. Divided into divisions (agriculture, engineering, home economics and liberal arts) in the late thirties, another division (graduate) was established in 1941 (another milestone) prior to granting of the first master's degree in 1944 (still another). 1951 and we became a University. 1958 and we gained full-fledged land grant status. 1962 What does the future hold in store for us?



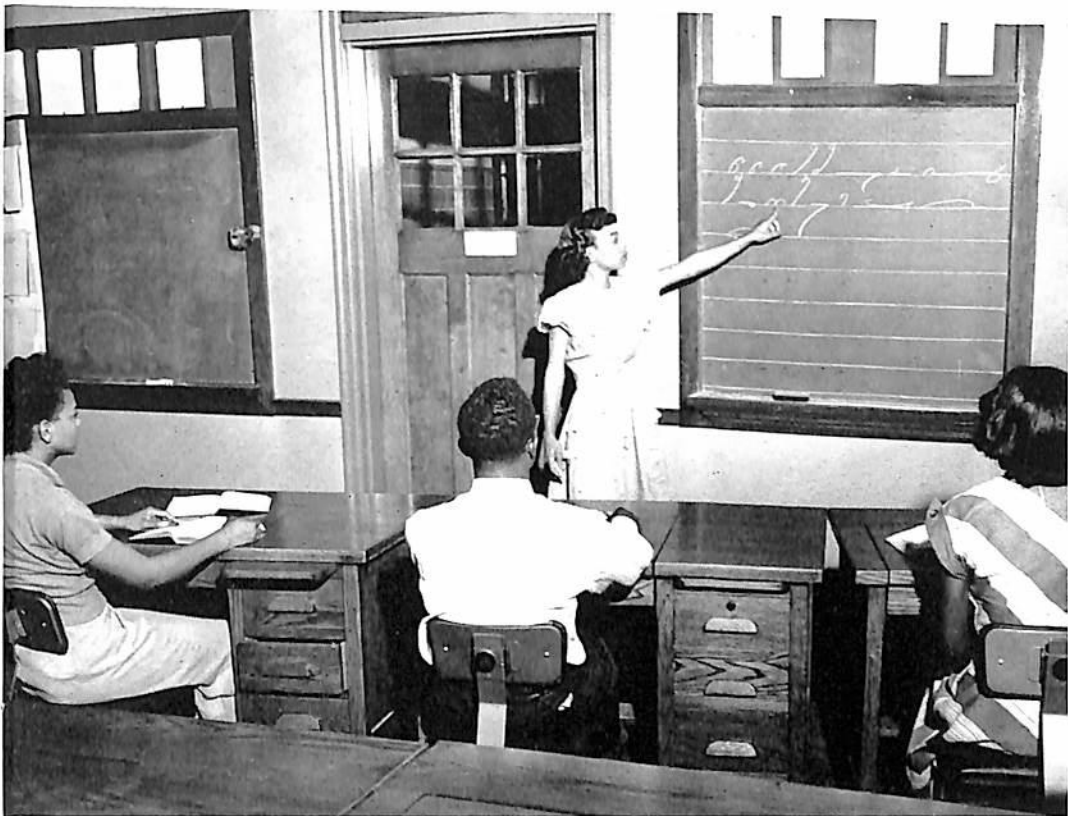
The program in Agriculture has always been a mainstay of the campus. Gone, however, are the days of simply hog-tending, hand-planting, and bucket-watering. Our present-day Ag students are lab-minded and concerned with soils-testing in the bio-chem lab, sausage-making in the Abattoir and calculating machine operating in the lecture halls. Also uppermost in the minds of modern Ag students are the prizes and awards to be won in expert livestock judging, excellent dairy herds and beef cattle as well as more than a working knowledge of horticulture and floriculture.





Gone are the days of domestic science and blue-bloomered girls in gym classes. Gone, too, are the classes in what was commonly referred to in the past as commerce. Nor are the art classes limited to simply courses in appreciation.

Home Economics majors specialize in dietetics, clothing and textiles and education. Commerce is now referred to as business education with typing and short-hand leading the list of course offerings in the area. Gym classes have become physical education classes and the course offerings no longer consist mainly of field-hockey and ring-around-a-rosy games, while art classes constitute a service area for nearly all other departments.



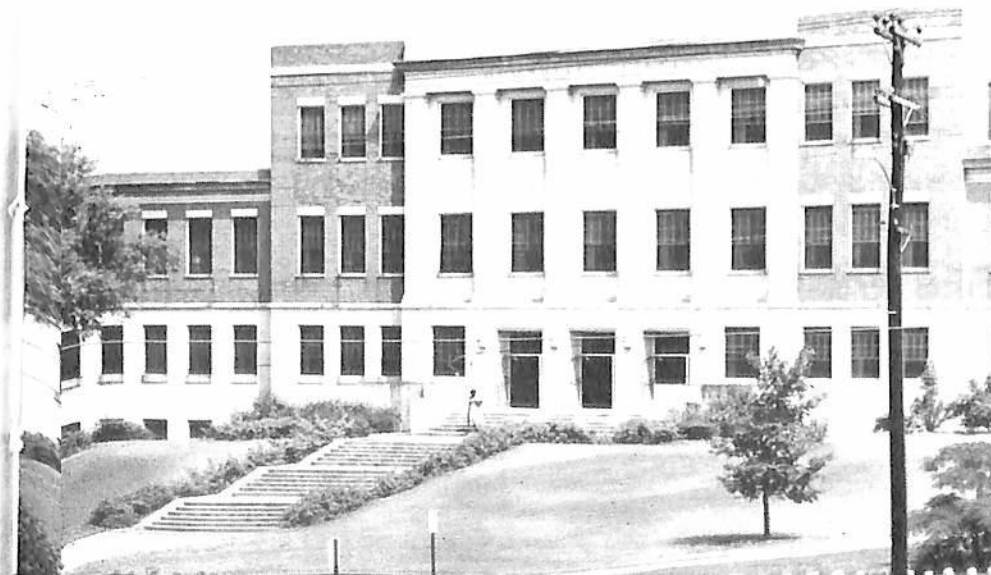


Time changes things. No exceptions to this rule have been the changes brought about on the face of things at Tennessee State. Produced by Father Time, the show has been brought to us through the courtesy of our State sponsor, featuring the extra-added attraction of gradual increases in the budget.

Thus in the interim between 1943 and 1951, six additional buildings were raised on campus.

By the 1950's Tennessee State had increased its land holdings from 320 to 450 acres and boasted 36 buildings.

The ravages of fire played a part in altering the face of the campus skyline and returning alumni missed the old familiar scenery, but in the annals of show biz the old adage quips: "the show must go on," and so it has.





After the hullabaloo and frenzy of the nomination convention itself have subsided, the sign posters wait restlessly far into the night for the witching hour, the time set by the Election Commission for such activity. To post a sign advertising the wares of a candidate before 12 midnight on the eve of a campaign would mean the immediate disqualification of that candidate, complete and utter doom for his followers.

Such goings on have been the looked-forward to events in the life of every Tennessee State student for years.

Controls had to be established to keep the elections on an even keel, but even so, tempers become short in the wake of getting a candidate enshrined for a year's term of office.

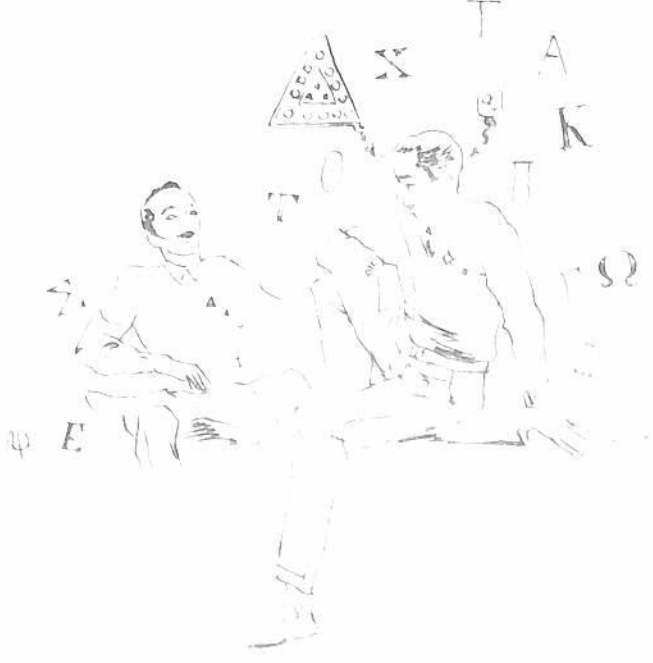


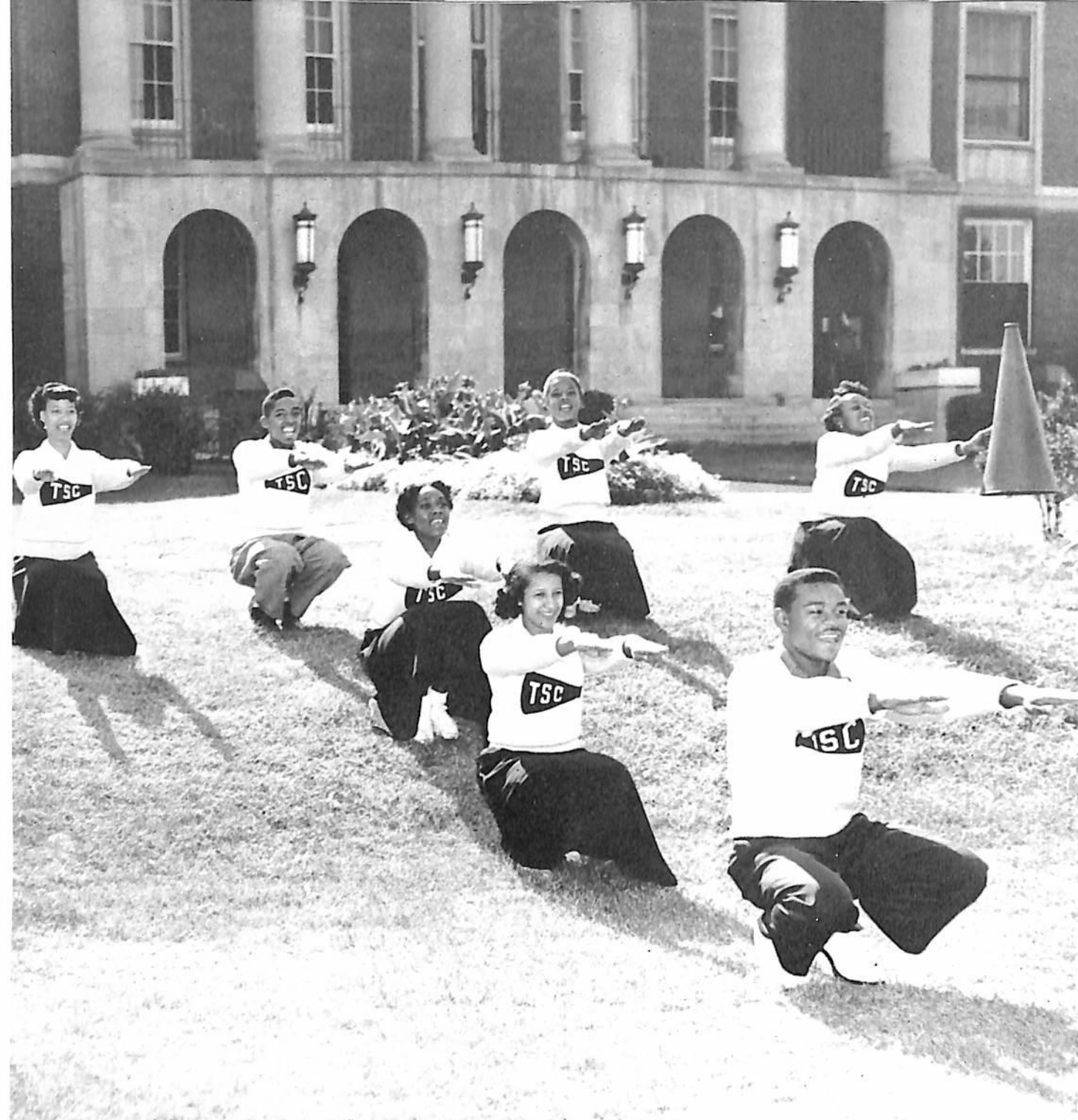


The battle for the positions of President and Vice-President of the Student Council and Miss Tennessee State rages on year after year.

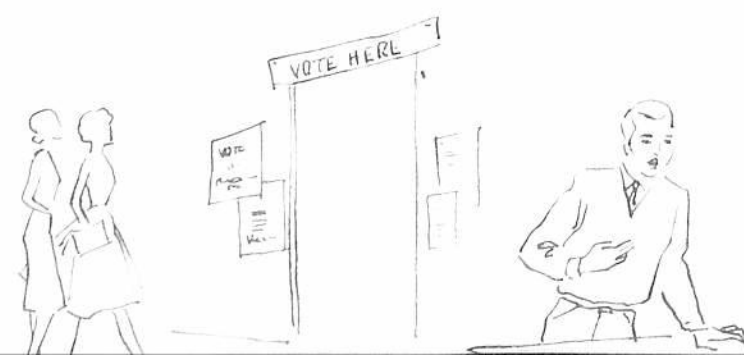

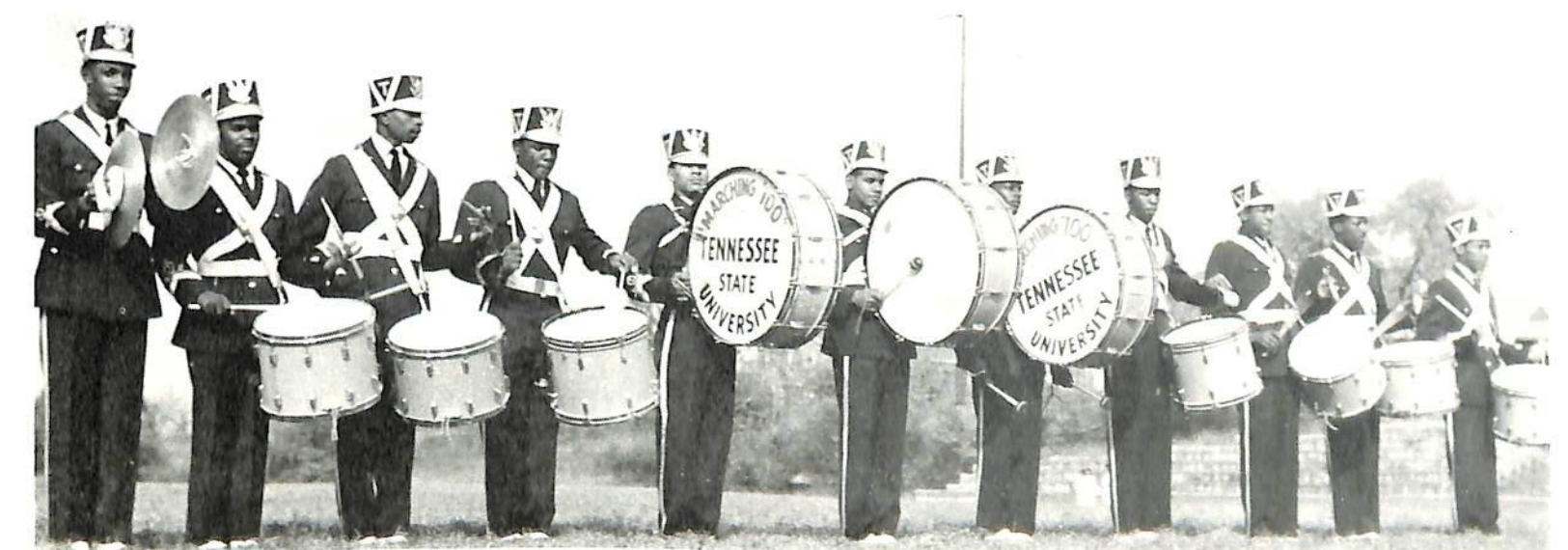
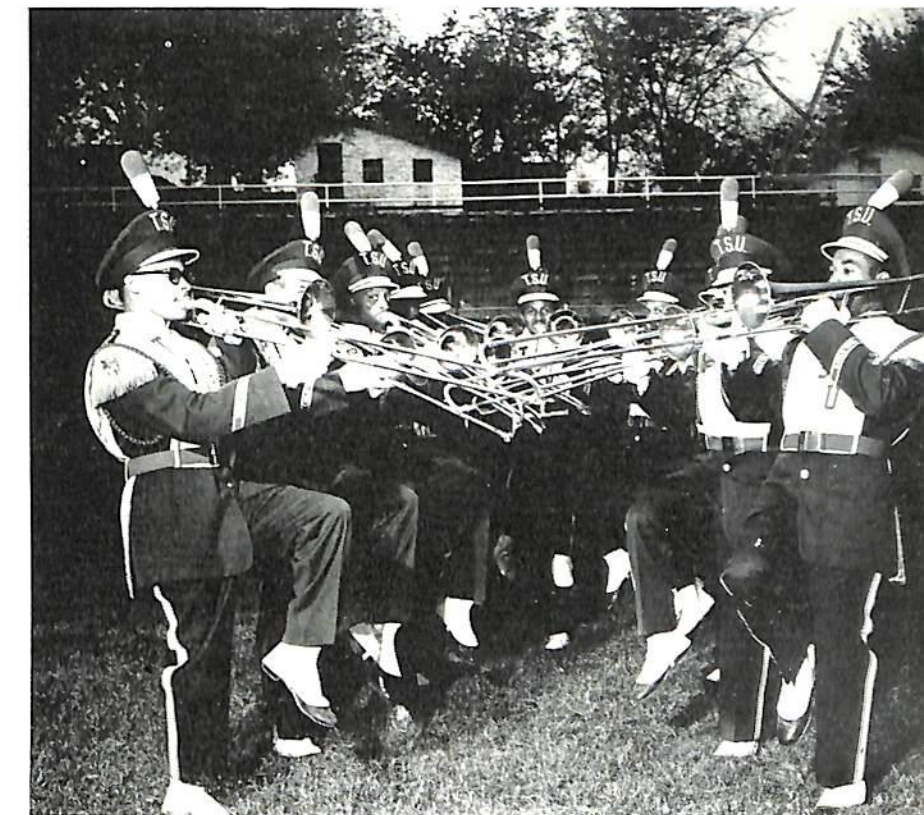

Widely known for their frequent nationally televised performances, the present day Aristocrat-of-Bands features the "new sound," block band dancing, and brilliantly executed formations.

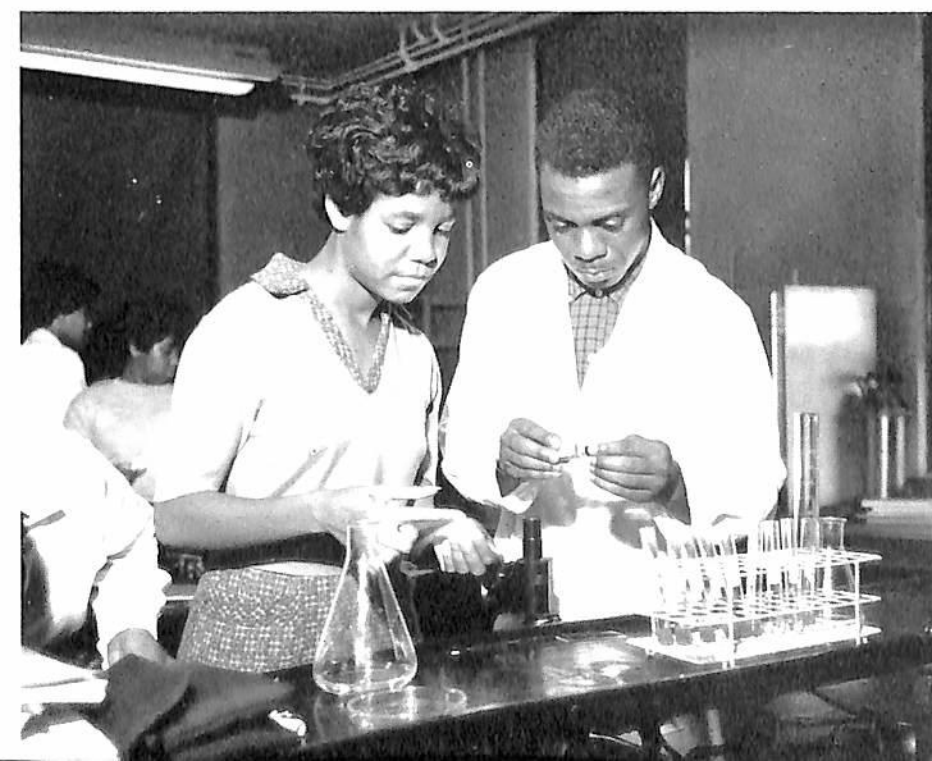


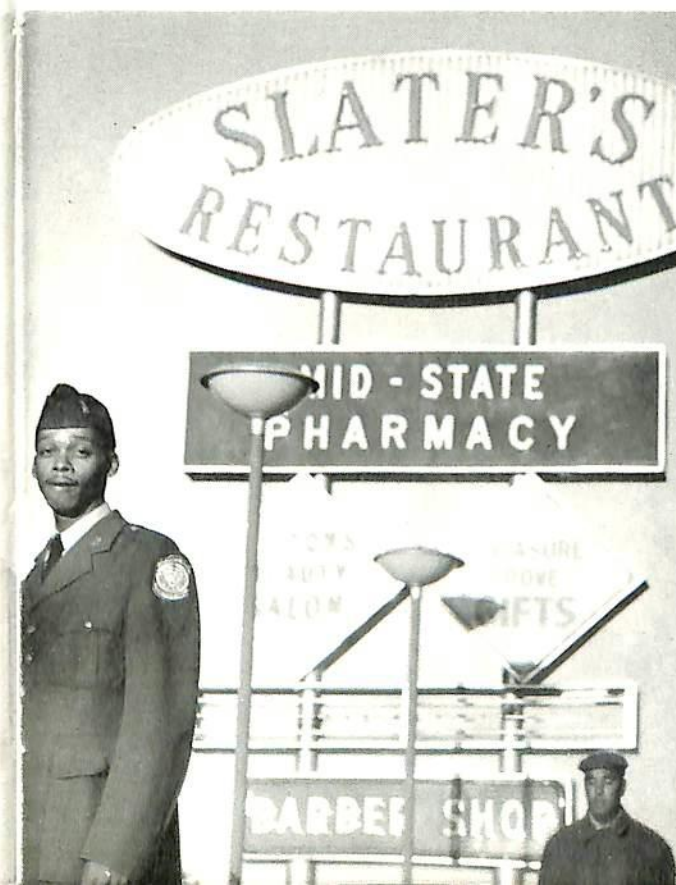
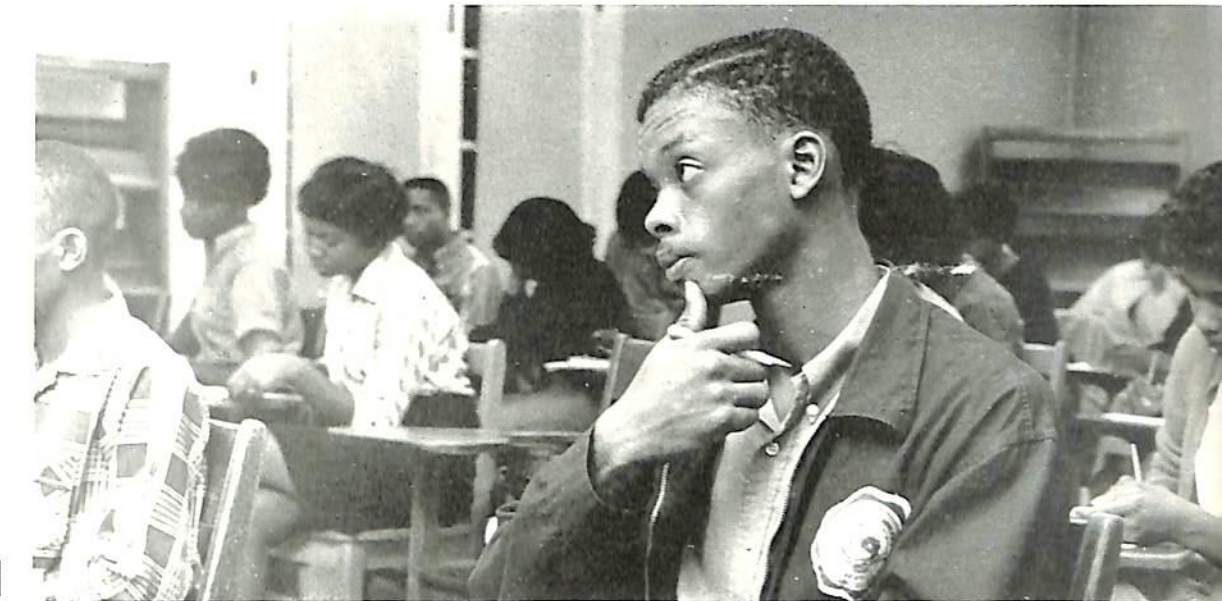


The first TV set on campus was presented to the students who frequented the Rec Hall by President W. S. Davis in 1950.

Only on rare occasions in our 50 year history has Tennessee State been able to house all its students on campus. Also a large majority of Tennessee State students are Nashville natives. For these reasons, city students have always been part and parcel of the campus scene.

In less than a half-century in intercollegiate competition, Tennessee State University athletic teams and coaches have been crossing one river after another towards THE top collegiate competition-NCAA University class circles. During the past ten years Tennessee State has become a power.

In their climb it would be unfair to the glory that is mirrored in this single decade's achievements not to mention that Tennessee State took her initial stride towards power-sports twenty-six years ago. At that time, Coach W. S. Davis' football player—Forrest W. Strange was named the first All-American in any sport from the University. Under the guiding genius of Henry Arthur Kean, the pace quickened.

Varsity Sports

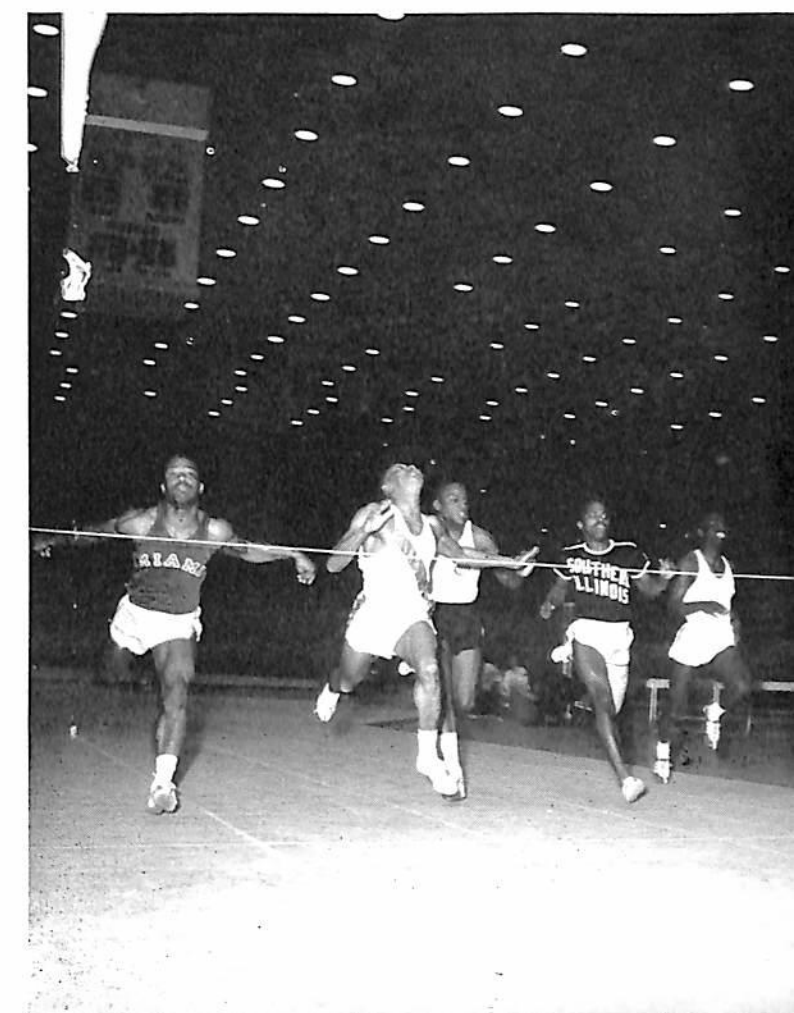




Fans, sports writers, and coaching circles have shown amazement at the deadly accuracy of Tennessee State's fastbreaking, precision-passing basketball artists. From a crow's nest, one-dollar perch or from a five-spot box, it's like watching the workings of a fine Swiss watch . . . skilled . . . precise . . . accurate . . . and to a basketball foe, deadly.

In 136 games former basketball coach Johnny McEendon's "Whiz-Kids" carved a niche in court history for the University when they first won the NAIA national crown and again as they became the first to win NAIA's coveted James A. Naismith trophy three straight times. While carving national fame the "Whiz-Kids" completely re-wrote the University's record book.



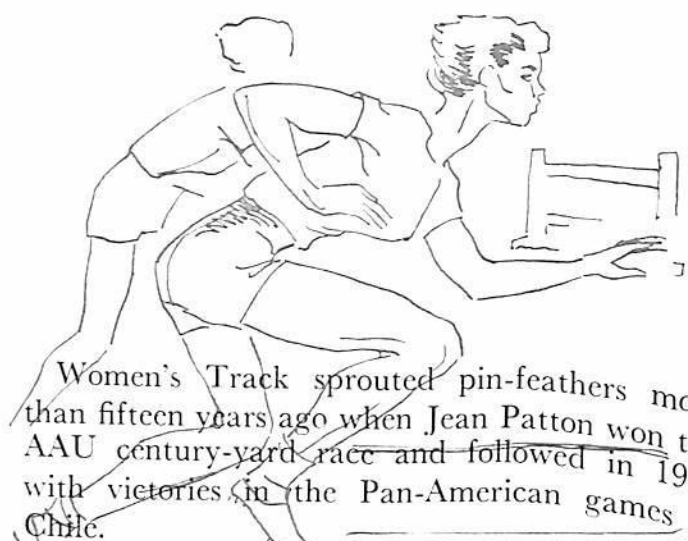


Blue and white thin-clad men sprinters have engraved the name of Tennessee State University on six mid-western conference titles and cracked the Drake Relays' 120-yard high hurdles and mile relay marks.

Under the mentorship of former track coach Raymond Kemp, names such as Willie Stevens, John Moon and Ralph Boston became track world by-words.

Ralph Boston's history making feat of blasting famed Jesse Owens' 20-year-plus world and Olympic broad-jump records astounded the sports world in 1960. Former track star Stevens now coaches the thin-clads.

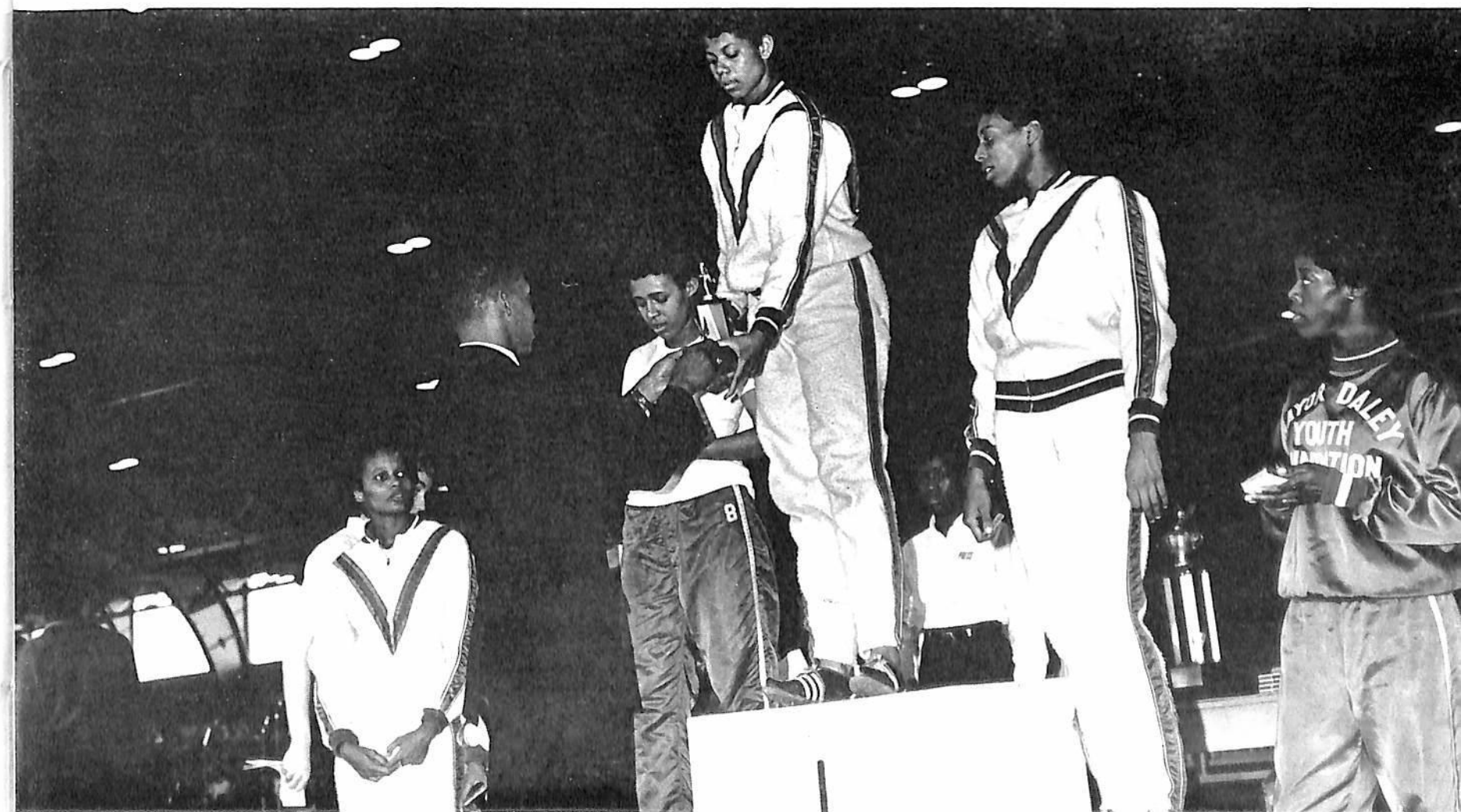




Women's Track sprouted pin-feathers more than fifteen years ago when Jean Patton won the AAU century-yard race and followed in 1951 with victories in the Pan-American games in Chile.

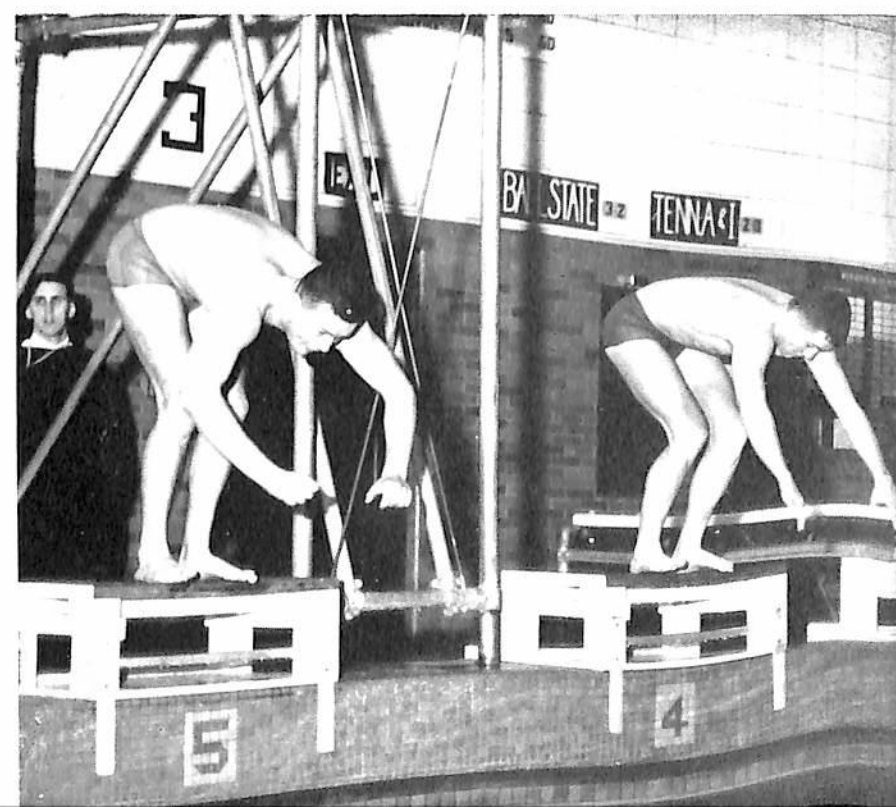
Since that time three T's—Tigerbelles, Tennessee State and Temple—have become the by-words of Women's track and field. Since the Tigerbelles, Tennessee and Temple laid a firm unyielding grip on the National AAU crown more than five years ago many questions have arisen: "Are the Tigerbelles really good or is it the lack of competition?" "Is Coach Ed Temple just lucky or does he have a secret formula for track success?"

So much for the doubting Thomases. The three T's have since given special notice of their greatness through the prowess of 1960 Olympic triple gold medalist Wilma Rudolph and her 400-meter relay gold medal winning teammates.





Swimming, baseball, and tennis have thrived on an independent circuit. The first three years of the present decade, Coach Tom Hughes' Tiger-sharks dominated the CIAA national invitational swimming meet after which they were barred from the only national college swim meet opened at the time. Our tennis teams have held their own against Notre Dame and Kalamazoo netters.

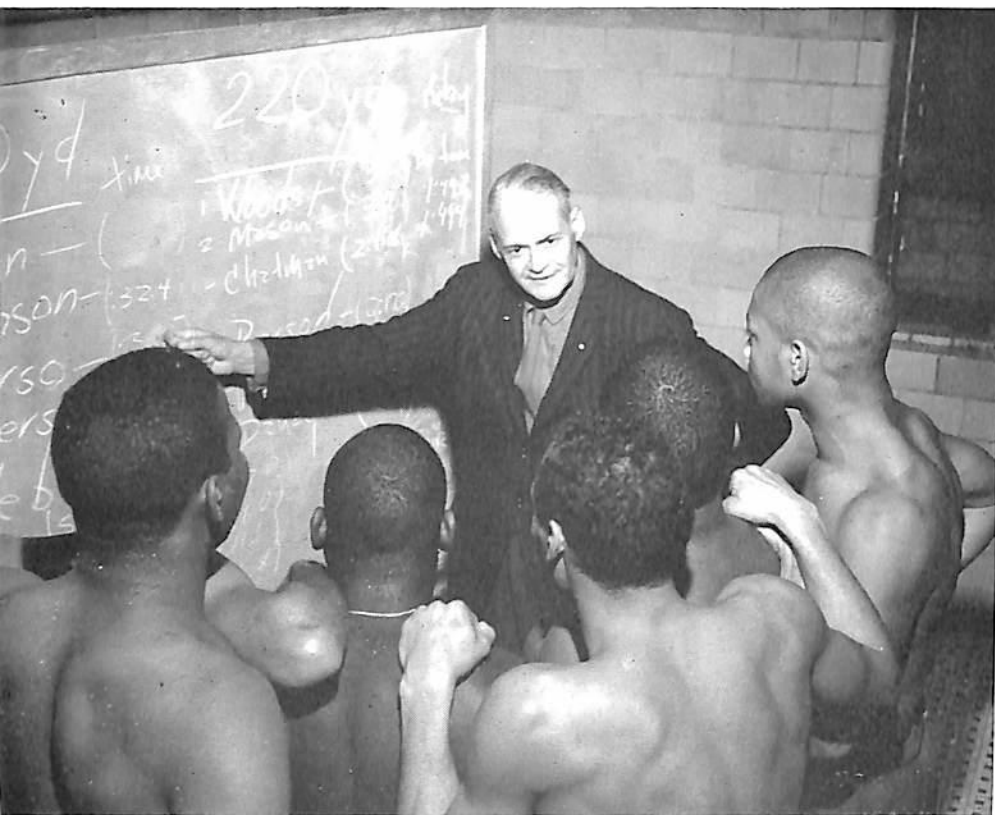

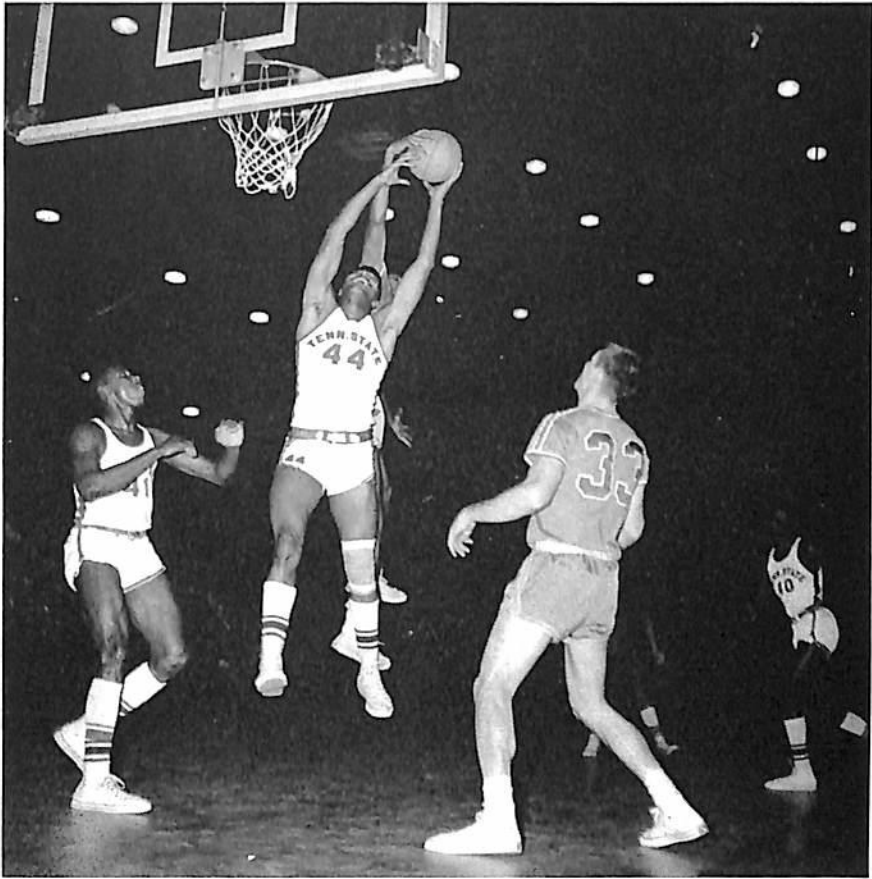

With an over-all seasons record of 17-8, the "Tigers" were rated seventh by the U.P.I.

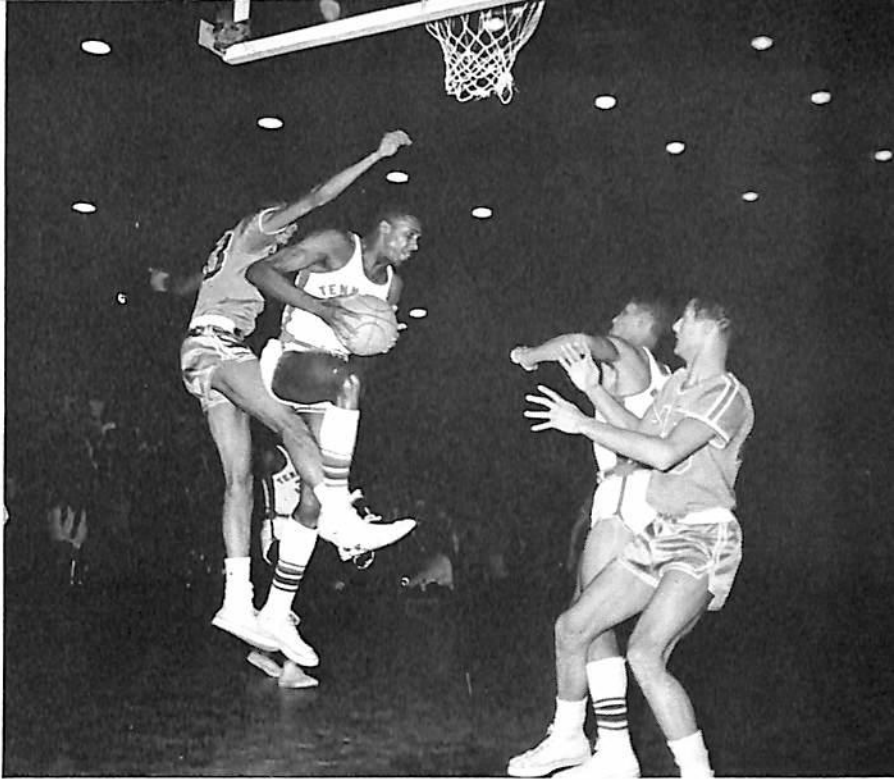

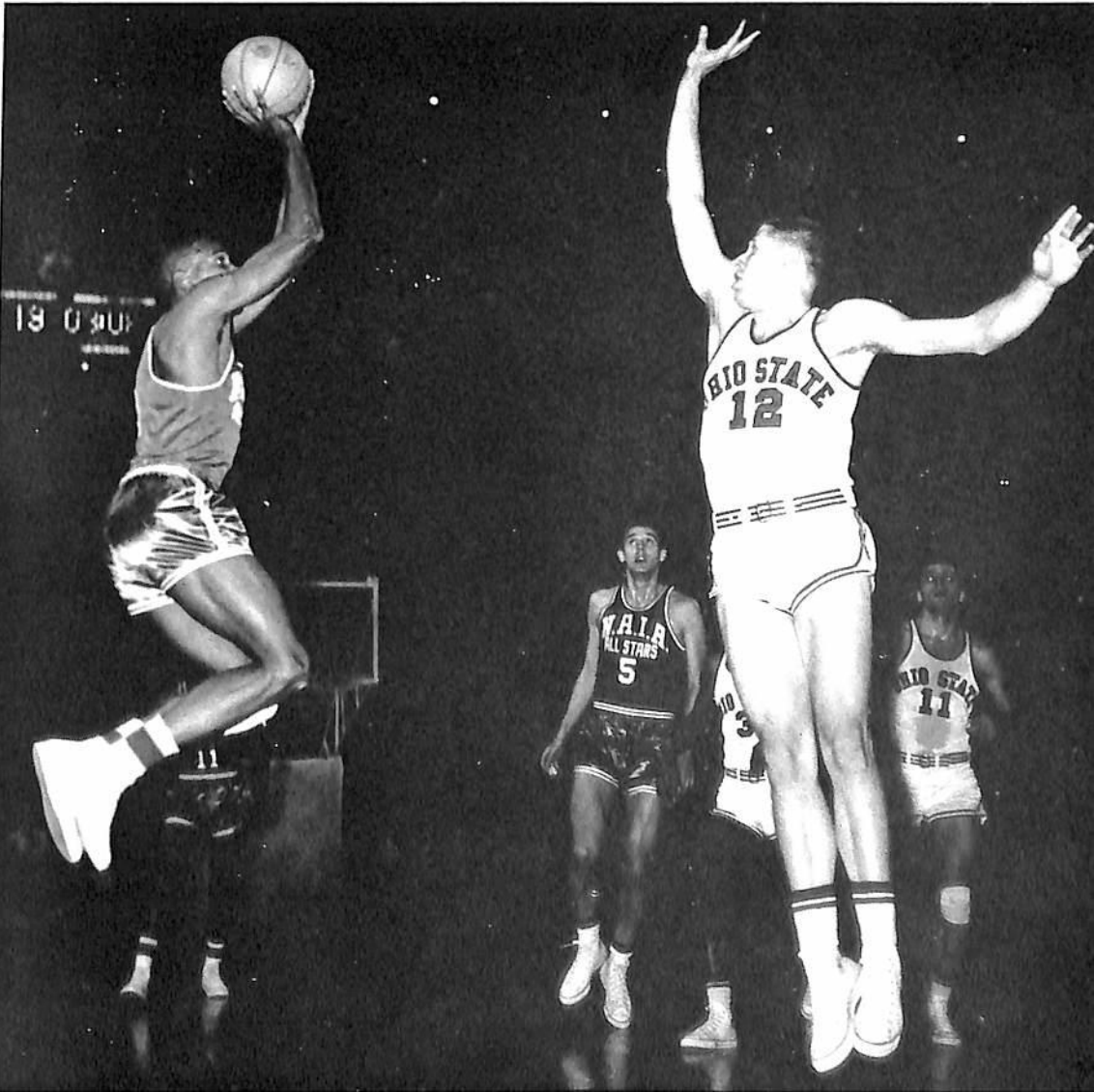

The outdoor nationals in Gary, Indiana marked the Tigerbelles' first victory of the year 1961 as they ran away crowned winners of the meet and added two more trophies to their collection.

Senior Tigerbelles participating in the outdoor nationals qualified for the overseas trip where the United States women and men's track teams met Russian, Germany, England and Poland.

While in Russia the United States Women's Relay Team set a new world record in the 400. Members of the team from Tennessee State were Vivian Brown, third leg and Wilma Rudolph, fourth leg. The record was smashed with a time of 44.3 which bettered the record set by the Tigerbelles at Rome in the 1960 Olympics.

The 220-yard dash was won in a time of 25.2 by Vivian Brown, making the Tigerbelles title holders of the meet for the second straight year.

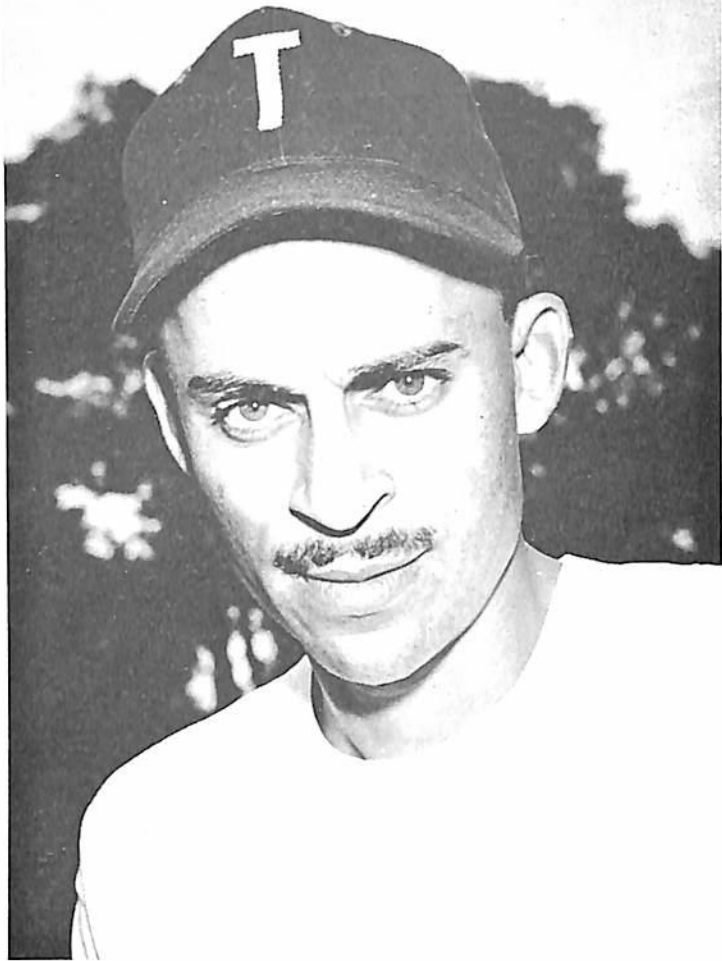
Baseball

In totaling the runs during the season, the Tigers scored 89 runs and their opponents scored 62. The average number of runs per game for Tennessee State was 5.1 while the average number of runs for opponents was only 4.3.
