



With a skimpy staff and a mid-year cut in the University's overall budget which left it gasping for breath, the University's student newspaper, The Meter, still managed to continue publication, on a limited basis, throughout the school year.

The staff eked out some information to its news-hungry campus public in six issues, fewer than half the number of issues expected to be published as school-year 1968-69 opened in September.

The list of students expressing an interest in working on the paper's staff dwindled as the school-year months rolled by and the diehards remaining at the school year's close numbered three. The trio may have been dismaved, at times frustrated, and even heart-broken by the long hard hours, lack of funds for the paper and absence of pay for the staff, but they were not discouraged, proving to all and sundry that they truly had printer's ink in their veins. So at the University's annual Awards Day Convocation, the three, Lynwood Holmes, Dwight Lewis, and Wendell Johnson, were cited with certificates of merit by the campus' Department of Publications and Sports Information for their courage and dedication to what must have seemed, at times, like a "What's the use?" cause.

















Starting off the 1969 season by making numerous errors and not getting timely hits, Coach Samuel R. Whitmon's diamond Tigers saw their early-season record dip to 4-6. However, by midseason, the players had shaken off the errors and had begun to get clutch hits to pull their record up to 9-7 with 11 games remaining.

The Tigers, led this season by seniors Robert Collins, Alfred Ladson, Ronald Braden, and Jimmy Roberts, got their biggest win of the early part of the season by beating Nashville's David Lipscomb College 13-12. The victory marked the first time the Tigers had defeated Lipscomb in the two years the teams have played each other, and going into the bottom half of the ninth in that history-making game, the Tigers trailed 12-9.

Leading hitters, so far this season, have been football star Albert Davis, who is hitting .422, and Willard "Purkey" Fletcher, who is hitting .419. Fletcher, a sophomore and the regular second baseman for the team, is considered one of the best glovemen in this area.

At this point of the season two things have come about for the first time in the school's history and both happened on the same day, March 26, in a game against Michigan's Calvin College. Alfred Ladson became the first Tiger hurler to pitch a no-hit ball game, and, to top everything, the game was played with snowflakes falling. The Tigers won 3-1, a walk and an error giving Calvin its run.

With 11 games remaining to be played and the Tigers a choice to win the majority of them, there are high hopes at Yearbook press time that the team will be invited to a post-season tornament. Last season the team had a 9-1 record but did not play enough games to qualify for post-season action.

Among the new teams that the Tigers played for the first time are Columbia State College, Calvin College, Wayne State University, Belmont College, and Middle Tennessee State University.



Fresh from the 19th Olympic Games, gold medal-winning Tigerbelles made the indoor rounds—New York's Millrose Games, Toronto Maple Leaf Invitational Meet, Cleveland's Knights of Columbus Meet, and the Mason-Dixon Games at Louisville—before going on to win their 13th national AAU Indoor Track and Field team championship.

At the very end of her freshman year under Coach Ed Temple, Madeline Manning celebrated working up to an upperclassman by posting a new world's record at 2:00.9 for the 800-meter Olympic gold medal and annexed the honor of becoming the first American woman in history to win an Olympic half-mile run.

The Mexico City-staged Olympic Games was to see another "first" written in the record books by the Temple-trained Tigerbelles other than three gold medals and three world's records they posted at the Games. Manning's half-mile run was one record and Wyomia Tyus, who had picked up her degree on the same day she qualified for the United States Women's Olympic team, nipped the 100-meter-dash tape in 11 seconds flat for a new Olympic and world's record and then she added another chunk of Olympic hardware by anchoring the American women's 4 x 100 relay, to a new world mark of 42.8,

All of the record-shattering gold medal winning received ample notice from the press and general public, but the most potent Olympic first slipped by virtually unnoticed by both the Olympic Games officials and the world's press corps who were in attendance.

When Tyus finisher first in the 100, it became the first time in Olympic history that a sprinter (male or female) became a repeat gold medal winner. Tigerbelle Tyus won the event in record time in the 1964 Tokyo-staged Olympic Games. Most certainly, her winning established another international record for Coach Temple who became the first track mentor

in the history of the world to coach a repeat Olympic sprint winner. Couple that feat with the record of coaching individuals who set three world records in one Olympic Games and it is bound to give Coach Temple a mark that other coaches will be shooting at for many, many years.










Swimming

Basketball

The fabulous Ted "Hound" McClain doing his thing . . . that is . . . packing the house.

"I don't like ending the season on a losing note," observed Coach Ed Martin upon his first year's 14-12 record as the Big Blue Cagers' boss. "But overall I am happy that I can say in all my years of coaching that I have never had a losing season."

Martin's revamped sophomore-studded magicians, led by Ted "Hound" McClain, pulled the year's biggest bit of magic when they began playing before standing-roomonly crowds in Kean's Little Garden for the first time in half a decade.

Martin attributed the year's success to the spirit in which the players accepted his basketball philosophy and objectives. McClain, who will be the nation's number-two scorer returning to college to play next year, ended the season by winning the Nashville college scoring title. He averaged 29.5 points per game over 26 contests and compiled 167 points over two years which puts

him in range of shattering Dick Barnett's four-year mark.

Martin had a pair of rebounding and shooting big freshmen to become fixtures in his starting five. Lloyd Neal, 6-6 (and growing) Georgia-born center, averaged 15.4 points per game while pacing the Big Blue cagers' rebounding with 14.6 a game. He sank 167 of 293 of his shots from the floor for a field goal accuracy rating of 56.9 that led his team. Bob Mathis, a Tuskegee, Alabaman, was second to Neal in rebounding with 12.8 per game while tipping 7.4 per outing.

Martin's Magicians will lose only one senior, Dwight Jones, who saw very little action this past season. With his starting five intact, Martin will also have McClain and 12 veterans with a little more game savvy which should put the "fear-of" for the Big Blue hoop hustlers in many of their opponents for the coming season.



Speaking about the 1968 football juggernaut, director of offense Alvin Coleman offered, "This is the most talented grop of football players I have ever coached. I have never seen many individual players whose talent I respect more than this team."

Coach Coleman was not alone in the appraisal of the Big Blue. From 11 men eligible for play-for-pay, nine of Coach John A. Merritt's charges signed professional contracts. And on the heels of the fantastic recognition accorded Big Claude Humphrey the previous year, the entire campus was caught by surprise when cornerback Jim Marsalis equalled Humphrey honor for honor. Jim was picked on the Sporting News All-American roster, Time Magazine All-American, the Associated Press's Little All-American, NEA (Newspaper Edi-

torial Association) All-American and the Pittsburgh Courier All-American berth.

Marsalis played in the North-South and the Blue-Grey games, drawing exceptional praise from Vanderbilt University's football coach, Bill Pace, who used him both on defense and offense in the North-South grid classic.



Men's Intramurals



Altogether more than four times as many students got into the intramural swing this year than in the first year of the revamped program a little more than 12 months ago. Approximately 13,000 spectators watched a combined force of 1,825 university students participate on 97 teams over 193 contests until the field had been narrowed to seven championship teams and three individual champions.

The men's program generally outstripped the women with better than half (exactly five-eighths) of the 2,000-plus male population actively participating, and drew 10,900 spectators to witness their co-curricular athletic antics.

Overall competition was divided into two—fraternity and independent—league plays. Like the world series, the league leaders battled for the title of University intramural champions in each sport.

Fortunately, no overall designation was issued for the team that won the most first-place trophies. If one had been given, the Omega Psi Phi and Kappa Alpha Psi fraternities would have been locked in mortal conflict for the "Mr. Best-All-Around Athlete" title and the nod

would have gone to the Kappa men of Kappa Alpha Psi.

Kappamen captured three team championships and one individual title while the Omegas won one team title and one individual top honor. The Omegas were runners-up in basketball, volleyball and softball, while the Kappas took the second spot in swimming.

Phillip Cooper, sharp-shooting from the charity line, bagged the basketball free-throw title for the Omegas and the Omega splash team took tankmen honors, with the Kappa swimmers second.

The Kappas edged the West Chargers 1-0 for the soft-ball crown, dumped the Tennessee Bears 12-6 for the touch football title and then eased past the Omegas for the volleyball championship in a single elimination tournament. Jerome Wyatt annexed the Kappas' individual crown by winning the ancient rural-based sport of horse shoe pitching.

From the Independent League, the Colts copped the netburning crown and the Bears were second in touch football, accounting for independent team finishes, while Howard Patterson stroked for the table tennis gold cup.













Unleashed Thirteen-College Program, Proudly

The University's now two-year-old Carnegie Foundation-sponsored Curriculum Revision Program, just another project challenged to prove its merits when it first began, is now a proud and representative on-the-scene-of-things campus regular.

Dr. Darlene Hutson is director of the University's part in the program which also includes 12 other colleges (North Carolina A. and T., Alabama A. and M., Bennett, Bishop, Clark, Florida A. and M., Jackson State, Lincoln, Norfolk State, Southern, Talladega, and Voorhees).

The program on campus began with 100 students, selected at random, from the freshman class. These students were provided with special courses in English ideas and the sciences. Special emphasis is that the students are not being "taught" in the traditional sense, but are being provoked to learn.

The program is designed to transform the student

from one who responds passively to learning into one who analyzes, initiates, and creates. These objectives are being accomplished by the program through classroom experiences that focus on the learner and his questions, rather than on subject matter.

Another special feature of the program is its Reinforcement For Learning Center, purpose of which has been to complement the course work as it is intimately related to the curriculum. Teachers use the Center as they work with individual students and small groups to improve basic reading and mathematics skills.

With a second set of 100 students picked for the program at the beginning of this school year, the Thirteen-College Curriculum Program has settled down to the "brass tacks" of having proved its worth and is getting on with the show.











The University's Bureau of Career Counseling and Placement, headed by Mrs. Annie G. H. Sasser, co-sponsored the new-type conference.








