

BIG BLUE ONE SHORT OF PERFECT RECORD



The Big Blue Tigers of 1971.

After a slow start, coach John Merritt's Big Blue Machine shifted into high gear and steamrolled its way to an 8-1 recrd in regular season play and closed out the year with a stunning come-from-behind upset win over McNeese State in the Big Blue's fourth appearance in the Grantland Rice Bowl.

Big John's grid Tigers stumbled to an 18-7 win over Alcorn A&M in the season opener at Memphis for their 15th consecutive victory. disaster struck the following week in the form of a 28-23 defeat at the hands of Texas Southern in Houston.

After that, TSU's fortunes took a turn for the better. Performing before a hometown crowd for the first time since the start of the season, the Tigers outclawed Eddie Robinson's Grambling Tigers 41-35. The following week, the Machine rumbled into Dallas, Texas, polished off Prairie View 42-20 and returned to Nashville for a Homecoming encounter with Florida A&M.

The FAMU Rattlers slithered into Vanderbilt's Dudley Field where 32,000 spectators, largest crowd of the year at Dudley and the largest hometown crowd in TSU history, watched in amazement as the prancing Tigers trampled the snakes into the Tartan Turf, 50-8.

From then on, the Tigers were unbeatable. They subdued Southern University's Jaguars 17-16 after a fierce struggle, smashed Morris Brown, 61-7, whipped Wisconsin State (Superior), 54-7 and humbled Central State 61-0.

The Merrittigers went into the Grantland Rice Bowl rated as the underdogs and McNeese State set out to prove the pundits right as the Cowboys took an early lead over TSU.

The Tigers' All-American quarterback, "Jefferson Street" Joe Gilliam, kept his wits about him and calmly unloaded three touchdown passes, the final one a 45 yard strike to Ollie Smith that gave the big cats a 26-23 lead. Clifford Brooks put the icing on the cake with a key interception with only four seconds of playing time remaining and the Tigers went home with the Rice Bowl victory under their belts.


The win in the Rice Bowl was a fitting climax to a record-breaking season. Gilliam posted a new mark in passing for a single year with 2,150 yards and tied the school record for touchdown passes in a single season with 25. Running back Charlie Thomas set a new school record for touchdowns in a single game when he scored five times against Central State.


The alert Tiger defense intercepted 21 passes during the season and returned them for 380 yards and five touchdowns. Larry Howse was the most successful air pirate with a total of seven hijackings for 171 yards.

Three of the 1971 Tigers, Brooks, Robert Louis Stevenson, and Gilliam, were drafted into the professional football ranks at the close of the season. Both Brooks and Gilliam were selected as All-American and both saw action in post season games.





The 1971-72 season found many positions that would have to be filled in order for the team to be respectable. Gone were Ted "Hound" McClain, (TSU's All American), Ronald Dorsey, (defensive standout), and Tony Moorman.

The team not only replaced these individuals but went way beyond all expectations and finished with one of the most productive seasons in the history of the school. The Big Blue jumped off to a great start winning eight games in a row before suffering its first defeat to strong Gannon College in Erie. Pa., 85 to 80.

In their early success the Big Blue were victorious in the Golden Valley Tournament held during the Christmas holidays in Wheeling, West Virginia. For their efforts, Claude Grant, Lloyd Neal and Ronnie James were named to the All-Tournament team.

Probably the highlight of the early season was the Tigers' first meeting with the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. The first game was played at Chattanooga before a sell-out crowd. The Tigers were victorious in a real thriller 92 to 87.

After the Gannon setback, the Big Blue really started to roll. Also, they started to move in the national wire polls, Associated Press and United Press International. It was at this time that all doubters started to believe that Coach Ed Martin and his troops were for real.

The Big Blue machine continued to roll mowing down such top teams as Central State, Carson-Newman, Lincoln, Kentucky Wesleyan, and the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga for a second time. In a brilliant climax to the regular season the Tigers won ten straight home games to the delight of their truly appreciative fans. All home games were played to a full house.

The winning ways of TSU were a tremendous team effort. Throughout the season various players played key roles on the way to glory. Lloyd Neal, last year's leader in scoring and rebounding, again was the leader and nucleus of the offense and defense. Leonard Robinson, after a brilliant freshman year, presented an even brighter sophomore year. Adding two inches and twenty pounds to his already sturdy frame "Rob" must be considered a candidate for All-American in his junior year. Richard Rucker and Albert Alexander, two truly team performers shared wing play with Robinson. Each had many bright contributions on offense and defense.

If one player is to be singled out as the "difference", it would have to be Claude Grant, the Nashville-born high post, who really came into his own in his senior year. Claude, a deadly outside scorer, was effective inside and outside breaking up the opponents double teaming on teammate Lloyd Neal. Along with Robinson and Neal, Grant helped form one of the top back lines in college basketball.

Of course, one cannot overlook the pressure contributions in the key positions of guard. Forecasters believed this would be the positions that would slow down the Big Blue express. However, Ronnie James and Jethro Brown together made believers of all, taking on all challenges and doing everything that was necessary for victory.

Every top team must have a good supporting cast. This was evident with

the Big Blue. At times the individuals coming off the bench were devasting. Heading this group was Larry Harris, who Coach Martin called his troubleshooter. Whatever was needed to make the machine go, Larry did. In all close victories Larry proved to be the driving force.

James "Hoop" Edwards, the darling of the crowd, was another one who could come off the bench and contribute instant offense. "Hoop" was the team's best long rage scorer with his long arching jump shots. He was death to zone defense.

The regular season found the Big Blue with a 22 and 1 worksheet. By virtue of this, Associated Press voted them the #1 College Division team in the nation. This is really a credit to the university, the city of Nashville, and the state of Tennessee. The team really did it the hard way.

With rewards in order the Big Blue Tigers also presented with a berth to the N.C.A.A. South Region Tournament held at Delta State University in Cleveland, Mississippi. This was the team's third straight invitation in three years. In the first round of the regionals the Big Blue edged LSU of New Orleans 80 to 79. This set the stage for the finals, pitting TSU against host Delta State. It is worth mentioning Delta State had not lost a home game in two years. Again odds not meaning anything to TSU, the Big Blue took all the marbles in the finals by defeating Delta State 79 to 73. There many broken hearts in the state of Mississippi at the conclusion of this contest.

It was on to the finals which were held in Evansville, Indiana where the top eight college teams would collide. In the opening round the Big Blue soundly defeated South Hampton College, the eastern representative to the tune of 95 to 55. After building a twelve point lead at half time Akron University in a come from behind effort defeated favorite TSU in an overtime in the semi-finals, 71 to 69. This was a crushing blow to the Big Blue who had their hearts set on going all the way. Even in defeat there was no doubt that the Tigers from Nashville were still the top team in the nation. Regrouping in the tournament consolation game, the Big Blue again showed their poise and defeated Eastern Michigan for third place 107 to 82.

TSU's final record was 26-2. This was not bad when in pre-season it was doubtful if this team would win half their games without the "Hound". All it did was improve upon the 1970-71 team's record of 24-3, making this year's team truly one of the university's greatest.

There were many individuals laurels, Neal again made All American. Grant, Robinson and Neal were selected to the All-City College Team.

Sophomore flash Leonard Robinson and Neal were first team selections on the All-N.C.A.A. Tournament team picked by radio, and T. V. sportcasters vocering the N.C.A.A. tournament.

Gone for next season will be Neal, Grant, Harris, Alexander, and Jerome Lee. These men will be hard to replace. However, Coaches Martin and Bill Gaines can look hopefully to a fairly experienced group of returnees. Besides Rucker, Robinson, Jethro Brown and Ronnie James, the Big Blue will be returning such individuals as hot shooting James Edwards, Reggie Williams and Manley Fuller. With this nucleus the team up on the hill should continue to be respectable, Big Blue style that is!!























THE FACE OF CHRIST

A Sculptor, Lt. Col. Gilbert N. Amelio, USAF, Staff member of the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado, presented the University's Fall Quarter lyceum attraction. Additional lyceum attractions, announced by Music Department head, Dr. E. C. Lewis, were Natalie Hinderas, pianist; Clarence Render, violinist; History of Black Music; and Nathaniel Gatlin, clarinetist.

The Face of Christ Presentation is achieved through the media of sculpture, drama and music. In some thirty to forty minutes, the sculptor, Gilbert Neil Amelio, presents to his audience a study in the history of art as it has portrayed the features of Christ. Three separated periods or art-eras are visited: (1) Byzantine Art, (2) The Italian Renaissance, and (3) The Passion of Christ. Combining the drama of these periods that inspired so many artists, sculptors, writers and musicians, Amelio sculpts the actual feature-of-themoment, as the particular era is developed. He visibly "conducts: the music as he models the face. Amelio calls it "Art-in-Being". "Art

should be witnessed during the creative activity," he claims. Beginning with the Byzantine period, the sculptor takes the audience through the 5th-7th centuries, then, jumping the gap in centuries into the 13th-15th centuries, he visits the style of the Italian Renaissance. The cultural and social influences upon the artist are explained as Amelio moves dramatically into the Passion scenes accompanied by dynamic musical backgrounds ranging from Debussy to Britten and Stravinsky. During the passion scenes, the audience sees and hears the brutality brought upon the accused Messiah. The audience becomes witness to the judgment seats of Annas, Caiphas, Herod and Pilate. The final scourgings, the mocking, whipping, fixing and the Crucifixion itself are vividly displayed as the Face reflects the torment and suffering endured by Christ. The audience is also reminded that Christ conquered death as He said He would, and a brief change in features illustrates the Resurrection, showing the crown of thorns changing into the crown of Christ the King.


