PLAYERS GUILD GETS EUROPEAN TOUR







CAMPUS PEACH BLOSSOMS CAPTURE TENNESSEE'S FANCY

Research begun seven years ago by Professor of Agriculture, Dr. Neal McAlpin, has resulted in the development of several varieties of peach trees suitable to the needs of the back yard gardener. Dr. McAlpin's breeding program, which he has carried on in a 14-acre experimental plot on the University farm, has produced hardy smaller trees with large fruit and beautiful double blossoms requiring minimum care. Stock obtained from Dr. McAlpin will be grafted by nurserymen this summer and young peach trees will be available to the public next spring. In the meantime, the campus peach blossoms are a conversation piece capturing the fancy of Tennessee farmers, home gardeners, sight see-ers and photographers.



ELECTION TIME AGAIN!!

















TIGERS "REBUILD" WITH AUTHORITY




Head Tiger Mentor

Before the start of the 1969 season, the gridiron Tigers seemed to be poised on the brink of disaster. Injuries, inexperience and lack of depth dimmed head Coach John Merritt's hopes for a successful season. "It's definitely going to be a rebuilding year in 1969, said Merritt. "I think that a year from now we will be on the verge of fielding a fine football team but this season is going to be an education for most of our young boys."

With that grim prediction ringing in their ears, the Merrittmen went to Frankfort for season opener against Kentucky State . . . and humiliated the Kentucky Thorobreds 40-0 on their home turf. That opening game set the tone for the rest of the season and the Tigers clawed down seven opponents, losing only to Southern University 30-22 and battling to a 26-26 tie with Texas Southern.

Offensively, the Big Blue scored 48 touchdowns and piled up a total of 325 points. Sophomores Joe Gilliam and Clifford Brooks alternated at quarterback position and passed for a total gain of 1,771 yards. Halfbacks Wayne Reese and Jake Mayes led a running game that produced a net gain of 1,195 yards. The Tigers were just as spectacular on defense, holding nine opposing teams to a total of 145 points with defensive ends Joe "Turkey" Jones and James Walker doing the lion's share of the tackling.

Five of the Tigers were drafted by professional teams—Joe "Turkey" Jones, Cleveland Browns; Claude Brumfield, New York Giants; Charles Williams, Miami Dolpins; Wayne Reese, Los Angeles Rams; Willie Johnson, San Diego Chargers.











HARDWOOD TIGERS GRAB NCAA SPOTLIGHT



NCAA South Regional and College Division Finals MVP Ted (The Hound) McClain and Coach.


The Big Blue hardwood Tigers made the 1969-70 season one to remember as they rolled to the NCAA College Division finals held at Evansville, Ind. before bowing to a strong Philadelphia Textile club in the championship game. On national television, before a capacity crowd at Roberts Stadium, the Big Blue ended one of the most exciting seasons in the school's modern history.

Playing one of the toughest small college schedules in the nation, the Tigers ended their regular season with an amazing 17-7 record. Included on the 1969-70 slate were such powers as Carson-Newman, NAIA Champs Kentucky State, defending NCAA champions Kentucky Wesleyan, SWAC powerhouse Grambling, defending NCAA South Atlantic champions Oglethorpe, Eastern Michigan University, archrival Lincoln University, and always tough Gannon College.

Big Blue followers gave the Tigers a chance for a 500 season with some breaks along the way. However, led by the offensive antics of All-American Ted (The Hound) McClain, the Big Blue rose to the occasion and opened the eyes of spectators everywhere they played. Playing before standing-roomonly crowds, and local television for all home games, the Tigers exceeded the expectations of the most

optimistic fans. McClain, the junior sharpshooter from Nashville's Pearl High School, had plenty of support from sophomore sensation Lloyd Neal and junior standout Ron Dorsey. While the trio mentioned carried the bulk of the scoring load, Robert Mathis and Charles Moorman rounded out the starting five with their superb defensive play. Supporting the starting unit were Al Alexander, Larry Harris, Claude Grant, Jerome Lee, Willie Fisher, and Jethro Brown.

Highlighting the season was the NCAA South Regional championship game between the Big Blue and defending 1969 NCAA king-pin Kentucky Wesleyan College at Owensboro, Kentucky. After trailing by 15 points with less than five minutes remaining, the Tigers' tenacious full court press and tremendous pride led them to a stunning 75-73 victory before 7,500 disbelieving Panther fans. After trailing throughout the entire game, Claude Grant put the Tigers ahead 73-71 with a goal with 1:51 seconds remaining and Ted McClain iced the victory with a pair of free throws with only four seconds showing on the clock, upping the margin to 75-71. Co-captains McClain and Ron Dorsey were chosen to the All-Tournament team while McClain was also named the Tourney's Most Valuable Player (see page 122)



Advancing to Evansville and the finals, the Big Blue rolled to victories over a tough South Dakota State team 92-89 and Buffalo State University 101-80 before dropping the championship contest 76-67 to Textile. Outstanding in the championship tourney was the balanced scoring of the Big Blue along with the super play of sophomore post, 6'8" Claude Grant who had played only sparingly during regular season. For his consistent and tremendous all-around play, Ted (The Hound) McClain was named MVP of the tourney.





The Diamond tigers opened the 1969-70 under the leadership of a new head mentor, Hylon Adams and hampered by rain in the early stages of competition.

The Tigers' first outing, a home game facing Memphis' LeMoyne College, was rained out. A week later, the Tigers journeyed to Alabama for a game against Tuskegee Institute, a game stopped after seven innings, because of rain, while Tuskegee was ahead 1-0. The next two outings, a March 21 game facing Montgomery's Alabama State and a March 23 confrontation of Huntsville's Alabama A. and M. were both rained out and the Tigers hustled back to their home state with everything dampened but their spirits, for a March

31 show-down with Murfreesboro's Middle Tennessee State Raiders. Still on the road, the Tigers split a double-header with the Raiders, winning the first game 2-1 and dropping the second to MTSU 4-2.

With the arrival of April (the rainy month) and back at home, the Tigers' scheduled April 1 game with Columbia State College, was promptly rained out. Of the remaining games, the Tigers had the May 1 game against David Lipscomb cancelled by precipitation and two games with Mississippi's Jackson State College cancelled for other reasons. Through May 9, the Tigers had a won-lost record of 5-7 with five games left to play, four of them at home.

TEMPLE "PLUS" AND TRACK

Quietly, without fanfare like the manner of its inception, the magazine NASHVILLE died the only death a publication would know with its last April issue. In that issue the sweat, toil, glory and success of Coach Ed Temple's 20 years at the Tigerbelle helm was highlighted in the article, "Two Nashville Pluses".

"This has been the poorest season for my freshmen in the two decades I've been coaching," Coach Temple ventured following some momentary reflecting.

Temple's dismal cryptic summation does not stand up on first inspection of the record. Last season, as they have for the past 15 years, the talented Tigerbelles won the Amateur Athletic Association's national outdoor Women's Track and Field team championship. Individual AAU champions Madeline Manning and Eleanor Montgomery reigned in the half-mile and the high jump, and Iris Davis and Martha Watson grabbed second in the century-yard dash and the long jump while both of Temple's 880 yard and 440 yard quartets romped across the finish line first, securing the Tigerbelles' 13th Outdoor Championship in 15 years.

Opening the indoor season, the Tigerbelle performances followed the quick ups and downs like a yo-yo on a string.

Spurred by the biggest victory in her entire cinderpath career, Pompano Beach, Florida-born Davis latched on to second place hardware in the indoor half-century finals. Coed Davis, last summer, in the America vs Europe Games in London upset Los Angeles' Barbara Ferrell in the century meter dash which established the little Mexico City-staged Olympic team member as one of the leading feminine sprinters in the world.

"Iris is the bright spot on our team," Temple offered. "She has done very well in Canada, in the Louisville-staged Mason-Dixon Games, at the Dogwood Relays and at Quantico Relays."


Temple also had praise for sprinter Mattline Render and long jumper Martha Watson but felt that, "These are lean years for us." Temple concluded, "We lost Manning right after the indoor season started and that was a blow."

Temple lost Olympic gold medalist and world record holder Manning to the lush life of love, and with her loss went his chances for fielding an 880 relay team because Manning ran the quarter-mile anchor leg.

The faultless flow precision-type baton exchanges is the hallmark of a Temple-coached relay team. They are so because the veteran cindercutie coach adopted the quartet race as his special thing. And of all of the cutting things like dropping his third indoor Women's team championship at New York last March, none have hit Coach Temple as hard as repeatedly losing the quarter-mile foursome run.

"I think we are going to have to change our philosophy and start building on individual performances rather than looking for team championships," Temple explored.

Along those lines Temple's little-heard-from men's thinclad trio have begun to carve headlines for themselves.

In the State College meet, that included all of the state supported schools except the University of Tennessee and Memphis State, Temple's men won the 120 high hurdles, the high jump and the quarter-mile dash which puts the Jefferson Street sprinters at the top of the heap for competition among Ohio Valley conference colleges.

Senior T. J. Johnson's copping of the 120 highs and taking second in both the 100 and 220 yard dashes, sophomore Larry Jackson's bossing the 440 and Alexia Simmons' towering in the high jump against the other state college sprinters were the performances that led Temple to exclaim that the men's Big Blue cinder program was on its way up.

"The Ohio Valley is our class of competition," Temple explained. "It is also on par and in line with the competitive track programs in the other state schools; therefore, it is just where our program should be.
























Male participants numbered 1,769, forming 76 teams, involving 217 contests, while female participants numbered 435, forming 44 teams, involving 102 contests.






















