

Dhanaraj Thakur is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Public Administration, Tennessee State University where he teaches graduate courses on research methods, e-government, and the politics of US policy-making. His research interests are interdisciplinary and include understanding the relationships between information and communications technologies (ICTs), political participation, and gender. His work has spanned countries in North America, the Caribbean, and West Africa.
