Angela Bright-White (7th and 8th Grade Social Studies Teacher – Philadelphia Elementary) – Angela has taught for 22 years in both Knox and Loudon counties. Angela has been involved with Ag in the Classroom for many years and works to integrate Ag activities in her Social Studies curriculum. She is currently a consultant with Tennessee Farm Bureau.

Tarol Page Clements, Ed.D. (Program Supervisor – Memphis City Schools) – Dr. Clements has more than 15 years of experience working in special education as a teacher, education specialist, and program supervisor. She earned her doctorate in Educational Leadership at Union University, Memphis Campus with research in inclusion, co-teaching and student achievement. Dr. Clements has presented at local, state and national conferences on a variety of topics regarding inclusion, co-teaching, differentiated instruction, collaboration and good teaching methods. As a program supervisor with Memphis City School's Division of Exceptional Children, she provides direct administrative supervision of 15 middle /alternative (prep) schools' special education departments and teaching staff. As a supervisor, Dr. Clements works collaboratively with parents, education professionals, and school staff to make important decisions regarding educational programming for students with special needs. Dr. Clements also works as an adjunct professor with Cambridge College Memphis and The University of Memphis teaching special education graduate school classes offering expertise in theory and practice.

Mary-Claire Hill (School Counselor and Music Teacher - Richard Hardy Memorial School) – Mary-Claire earned her B.S. in Elementary Education from David Lipscomb University in 1982, her M.Ed. in Curriculum and Instruction from the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga (UT-C) in 1985, and her M.Ed. in School Counseling from UT-C in 2005. She works with students in PreK-12th grade and uses music every day in her classroom. A 30-year veteran in education, Mrs. Hill has amassed a tremendous repertoire of music that helps teach concepts in every subject.

Wendy Cornelisen (Special Projects Coordinator - Tennessee State Library and Archives) – Wendy is a librarian with extensive training experience. She has led the Tennessee Electronic Library for the last two years, during which use of the online library has increased 30 percent. A passionate advocate for equal access to information no matter where you live, Wendy has partnered with the Tennessee Department of Education to further promote TEL. She is the immediate past president of the Tennessee Library Association.

Donna Jerden (Principal – Morgan County Schools) – Donna Jerden is a principal at an elementary school in Morgan County. She taught for several years in middle school and served as librarian for an elementary, two middle schools, and a high school. She has been an advocate for public education and spent four years on TEA's staff as a UniServ Coordinator. Her love of teaching children caused her to return to the classroom and then administration. She enjoys many things in her non-existent spare time: reading, storytelling, knitting, crocheting, and spending time with her eight grandchildren. She is the director of the Morgan County Imagination Library and is very involved with her church.

Nicole M. Kendall, Ed.D. (Associate professor and interim chair in the Department of Teaching and Learning - Tennessee State University) – Dr. Kendall also serves as a senior member of the National Education Association's Content Quality & Review board that recommends online professional development courses to the NEA Academy. Dr. Kendall is a former online mentor and instructor for the Tennessee Board of Regents Online Degree Program and served five years as an educator for Metro-Nashville Public Schools.

Dr. Kendall, a sixteen-year member of the National Education Association and an active member of the Tennessee Education Association, has served as higher education board member and president of the TEA-Department of Higher Education. Dr. Kendall consults as a technology, classroom management, and student advocate trainer. In addition, she has been featured in Association publications and commercials for which she hopes "individuals will see the true spirit of all educators who give so much to educate today's youth!"

Denette E. Kolbe (Assistant Director of Schools – Putnam County School System) – Denette is currently in her 19th year of public education with the Putnam County School System. During this time, Denette has spent eight years in the classroom as a 7th and 8th grade math teacher; eight and half years as an assistant principal and principal of Burks Middle School; one year as supervisor of data analysis and training; and is currently in her first year as assistant director of schools in Teaching & Learning.

In 2010, Denette was selected as a Regional Value-Added Specialist for the Upper Cumberland Region and the state of Tennessee. Her expertise on the data whether for accountability, teacher effect, or as a tool for classroom teachers to "peel back the onion," allows for the understanding of test results and their use as a tool.

Lori Napier (Facilitating Teacher – Maury County Teacher Center) – Lori Napier began her career with Maury County Public Schools in 1988 as a high school history and English teacher. During the 2007-2008 school year, she became a certified trainer for the Dinah Zike Academy and since that time has presented on Foldables® across the country as well as extensively within the state. She has a passion for helping teachers meet the demands of our changing profession.

Ron Pendergrass (Executive Director - TRTA) – Ron is currently retired from teaching and as a TEA UniServ Coordinator with 34 plus years of experience. He started working for the Tennessee Retired Teachers Association in 2005, and he has served as the TRTA Executive Director since 2009.

Manuel Scott (Motivational Speaker) – An Original Freedom Writer whose story is told in the Hollywood movie, "Freedom Writers." Manuel's unique message is one that has inspired, educated, and empowered almost a million people, helping them make the most of their lives.

At the age of 14, Manuel dropped out of school, and his English grammar was so poor that he was classified as an English as a Second Language (ESL) student. By the age of 16, he had already lived in 26 different places. At an early age, he began using drugs and alcohol. He says, "When I look back, I now see that I was heading down a path that would have destroyed me."

However, due to an amazing transformation, Manuel has defied all the odds stacked against him, which he credits to his teachers. "I was once dismissed as 'unreachable' and 'unteachable,'" says Scott, "but something special happened, and I love sharing that message with others."

The high school drop-out now holds degrees from the University of California at Berkeley and Trinity International University. He is currently working on his Ph.D. in Chicago, Illinois and is the author of *Take Matters Into Your Own Hands: Dream Now!*

Whether in Houston or Hong Kong, Kansas City or Cairo, Los Angeles or London, Scott carries a torchlight of hope into the recesses of dormant human potential, and shows the gems that are sparkling there.

Barbara Williams (Independent Educational Consultant) – Barbara retired after more than thirty years as a Tennessee English teacher and ELA/Literacy consultant. She has presented at workshops for the Tennessee Department of Education for the past ten years and currently works as an independent educational consultant in Tennessee.
