

**PSYCHOLOGY ACADEMIC MAP: DEGREE BS (120 CREDIT HOURS)**

This degree map is a semester-by-semester sample course schedule for students majoring in **Psychology**. The schedule serves as a general guideline to help students stay on track to graduate in four years or less.

The philosophy of the Department of Psychology is embodied in the concept that psychology is a discipline that contributes to the understanding of human behavior and experience. The emphasis of the program is on the scientific study of behavior and practical applications of this knowledge. The objectives are to provide undergraduate majors and minors with courses of study and related experiences that offer:

- 1) A general avenue for increased understanding of human behavior;
- 2) A solid foundation for advanced study leading to careers in the fields of psychology, counseling and guidance, or to study in the health professions, social work, and pupil personnel services;
- 3) Training for bachelor's level entry into careers in mental health services, industry and human services; and
- 4) The ability to enhance the quality of one's life and to relate more effectively with others.

The undergraduate curriculum in Psychology terminates in a Bachelor of Science Degree. All majors are required to complete a total of 120 hours, 42 of which must be upper division (3000-4000 level) and 42 of which must meet the University's General Education requirements. The Psychology major consists of 33 credit hours of Psychology courses, including 15 credit hours of required courses and 18 credit hours of limited option courses that must be selected from four content areas.

Majors must earn a grade of "C" or better in all Psychology courses counted towards the major. Students who earn a D or F in a required psychology course must repeat the course and earn a "C" or better. In addition, if one course is a prerequisite for another course, then students must earn at least a "C" in the prerequisite course before taking the course that requires it.

Forty-four (44) credit hours of General Elective courses comprise the remaining degree requirements. Students with the assistance of an academic advisor can make decisions concerning their professional preparation when enrolling in general elective courses. Depending on one's career goals, minors to consider include Professional Writing, Spanish, Marketing, Business, Non-profit Management, Africana Studies, or Political Science.

Tennessee State University recognizes that students have diverse learning, life, and professional experiences. The University provides opportunities for students to earn college credit toward the degree through a number of assessment options that evaluate their learning experiences. These paths are grouped under the category "Prior Learning Assessment" (PLA). Various means of earning PLA credit at TSU are the following: Advanced Placement Program, American Council of Education (ACE) Military Credit, College Level Exam Program (CLEP), DSST Credit by Examination Program (includes DANTES Examination), Institutional Course Challenge Exams (Departmental Exams), International Baccalaureate Credit, Other Military Service, and Portfolio Assessment.
