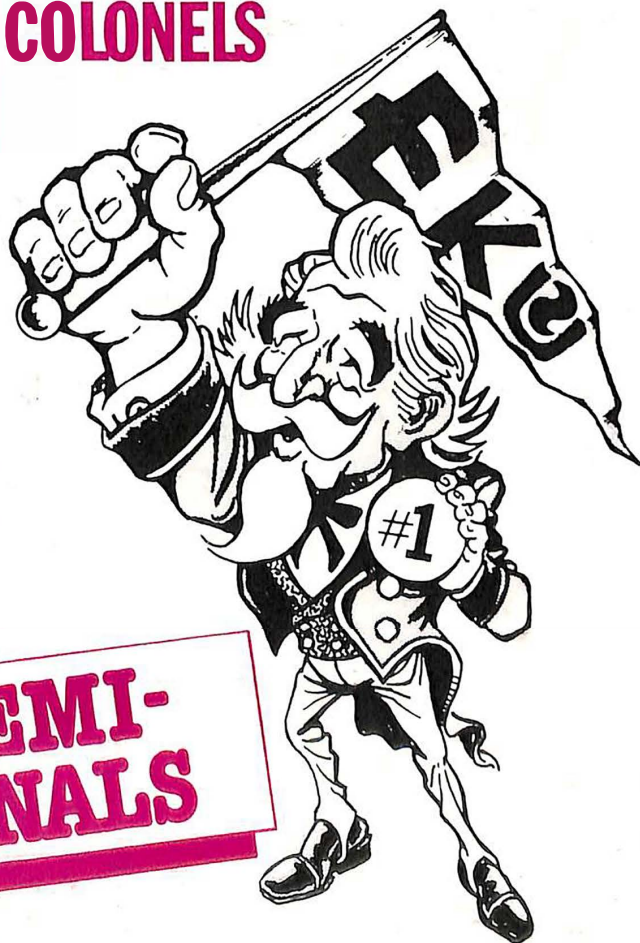

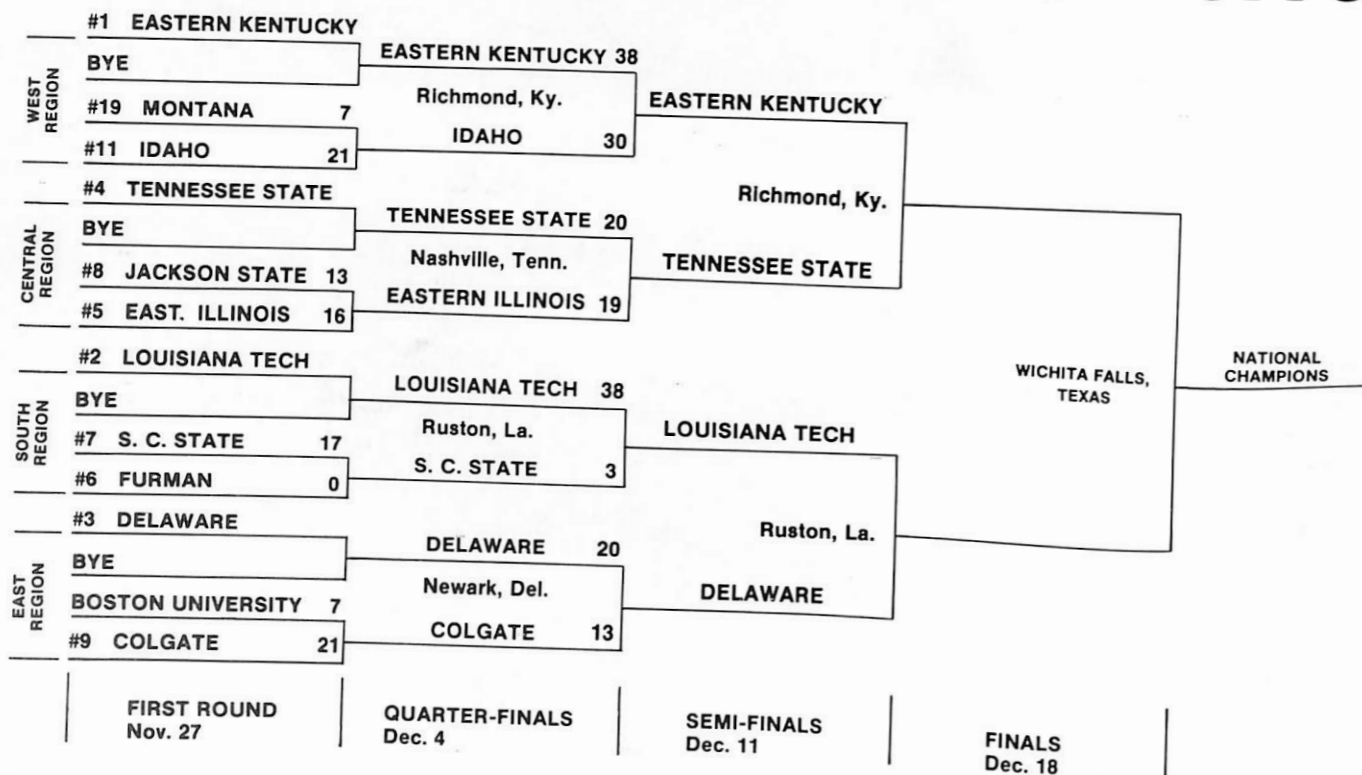

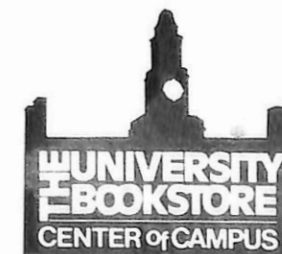

NCAA: Serving Higher Education

Now in its 77th year of service, the National Collegiate Athletic Association continues to meet the demands of its member institutions. While serving the nation's colleges and universities, the NCAA is the voice of intercollegiate athletics.

A call for stricter control of college football by President Theodore Roosevelt because of the violence in the game brought together 13 institutions in 1905, formulating the original communications base for college athletics.

This initial body called itself the Intercollegiate Athletic Association and was officially constituted March 31, 1906. In 1910, the name was changed to the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

More than seven progressive decades have molded this original 13-member body into a membership today of more than 900 colleges, universities, conferences and affiliated organizations.

Administration and rules interpretation occupied early efforts of the organization. Shortly after World War II, the NCAA adopted legislative and executive powers, changing its function into one dealing with virtually all issues concerned with intercollegiate athletics.

Many things have become associated with the NCAA during its colorful history. Highest priority goes to the service it provides to its members, acting as the true "voice" of college athletics today.

Each January the NCAA membership comes together at the annual Convention to review, propose and amend legislation. The Convention presents the opportunity for the nation's institutions of higher learning to speak and act on athletic matters on the national level.

Acting in the best interests of its membership, the NCAA strives to perform these specific functions among its many other responsibilities:

- Conducts 42 annual National Collegiate Championships in 19 men's sports for three separate divisions. Three championships (Division I, Division II and Division III) are held in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, swimming, tennis, outdoor track and wrestling. Two championships are staged in gymnastics, lacrosse and ice hockey. Fencing, rifle, skiing, indoor track, volleyball and water polo hold single National Collegiate Championships, while football is contested in Divisions I-AA, II and III. The NCAA is conducting 31 women's championships

in the 1982-83 academic year in addition to the 42 held for men. Women's championships will be held in all three divisions in basketball, cross country, field hockey, softball, swimming, tennis, outdoor track and volleyball. Two championships (Division I and Division II) will be staged in gymnastics, while fencing, golf, lacrosse, soccer and indoor track will hold single National Collegiate Championships. The National Collegiate Championship dates back to 1883 in tennis; and during this 100-year history, more than 13,000 student-athletes have earned the coveted title of "National Collegiate Champion."

- Maintains 23 men's sports committees, including 14 men's rules committees to formulate, copyright and publish rules of play for the government of collegiate sports. Members of these and many other committees, including 16 women's sports/rules committees, are elected by representatives of member institutions at the annual Convention.

- Publishes a tabloid newspaper 46 times per year, rules books in 12 sports, record books in football and basketball and various other publications.

- Collects, compiles and distributes the official statistics of college football, basketball and baseball in men's sports, and basketball and softball in women's sports.

- Conducts studies as a means of developing solutions to athletic problems.

- Represents the membership in legislative and regulatory matters on the state and Federal levels.

- Annually selects the College Athletics Top Ten and the Theodore Roosevelt ("Teddy") Award—the Association's highest honor.

- Administers an honors program which annually awards 90 postgraduate scholarships to recognize outstanding senior student-athletes who have excelled in the classroom as well as athletics. This scholarship is for \$2,000. The program has provided \$1,784,000 to 1,354 recipients since its inception in the 1964-65 academic year.

- Promotes and participates in international sports planning and competition through membership in the United States Olympic Committee, Amateur Basketball Association of the USA, Track and Field Association of the USA, and the United States Baseball, Gymnastics and Wrestling Federations.

- Maintains more than 80 full-time staff members at its national headquarters in Mission, Kansas, under the supervision of Executive Director Walter Byers.

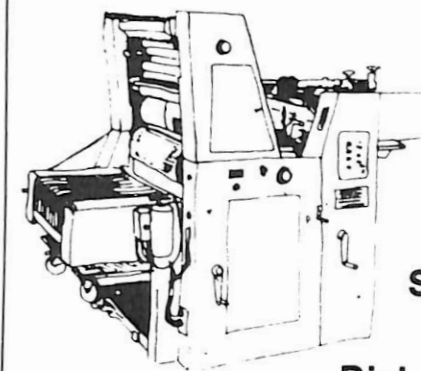

EASTERN KENTUCKY UNIVERSITY

For more than a century now higher education has enjoyed a continued existence on the site of Eastern Kentucky University's "campus beautiful," located in historic Richmond where the famed Bluegrass region meets the foothills of the Cumberlands.

Today's modern Eastern has a rich past dating back to 1906 when a group of public-minded citizens were successful in prompting the Kentucky General Assembly to create an institution of higher education in Richmond. The selection of this community as the home for Eastern Kentucky State Normal School, a two-year institution, was a rather easy decision for the state legislature since Richmond previously served as the site of Central University from 1874 until its merger with Centre College in 1901 and then as Walters Collegiate Institute until 1906.

In 1922, Eastern became a four-year institution and its name was changed to Eastern Kentucky State Normal School and Teachers College. Eight years later the words "Normal School" were dropped. Another red-letter date occurred in 1935 when Eastern offered its first graduate-level degrees. The most significant date in Eastern's development occurred in 1966 when a bill was signed into law renaming the institution Eastern Kentucky University.

Since 1960, when educational leaders foresaw the post World War II "baby boom" explosion, Eastern has more than quadrupled its undergraduate and graduate enrollments while expanding its physical plant from a value of \$7 million to over \$140 million today. In just two decades Eastern has been transformed from a state college into a large regional university serving over 13,000 students from all of Kentucky's 120 counties, 39 states, and three dozen foreign countries.

Some of the credit for the amazing growth can be attributed to Eastern's location. Richmond is situated just minutes away from the so-called "Crossroads of America," (North-South Interstate 75 and East-West Interstate 64), and a network of other super highways that makes the campus easily accessible.

But, perhaps the most impressive reason for Eastern's rise as a regional university are the some 300 degree programs and options offered through its nine academic colleges and graduate school.

A well-trained faculty, excellent facilities, and sound academic offerings are provided in each of the colleges which include: Allied

Health and Nursing; Applied Arts and Technology; Arts and Humanities; Business; Education; Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Athletics; Law Enforcement; Natural and Mathematical Sciences; Social and Behavioral Sciences. It is clearly evident that Eastern's scope has been broadened far beyond its original mission of teacher preparation and has developed strong academic programs in business areas, health fields, science and technical disciplines, and law enforcement. The University is the state's largest producer of nurses and the College of Law Enforcement is regarded as one of the nation's finest programs.

In addition to the breadth of Eastern's programs, the depth of academic preparation has not gone unnoticed. Eastern, along with a prestigious eastern United States institution, was cited recently by the American College Testing Service, the developers of the college entrance examination, for showing the most progress in teaching general educational skills that enable its students to function effectively after graduation. This A+ rating is indicative of Eastern's emphasis in providing its students with a broad liberal arts education in areas other than their chosen academic major.



The University, in addition to being a highly respected academic institution, is also noted for its program of intercollegiate athletics which places strong emphasis on the development of the student athlete. While the strive toward excellence is ever important in the academics, this same attitude is applied to the intercollegiate athletic program.

Eastern offers seven sports for men, six for women, and two co-educational sports. In addition, an extensive intramural program is available to students. Each of these sports is supported by some of the finest facilities in the southeastern U.S.

Eastern's student athletes have brought prestige to the University through their accomplishments in Ohio Valley Conference and NCAA competition. National championships, conference titles, and All-American performances have become synonymous over the years with Eastern's athletics program.

And while it is true the lists of team and individual honors serve to unite the students and alumni, generate enthusiasm among the public, and create a sense of pride throughout the campus, Eastern is careful that these side effects do not become ends in themselves.

It is not the objective of Eastern's athletic program to always outscore the opponent, though that would be a worthy goal. Rather, it is the University's philosophy that the intercollegiate athletic program contribute in the most positive way to Eastern's main objective-- education of students for their role in the arena of life.

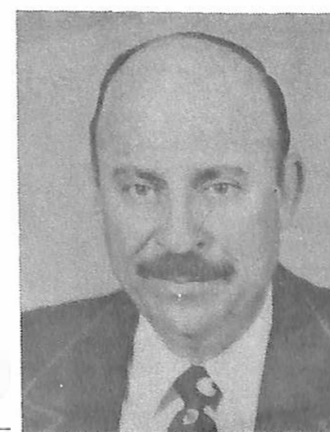
Aside from the vast academic opportunities that are offered by the university, there are more than 80 university

Leads Colonels to Fourth Straight Playoff Spot

Roy Kidd, ECU Head Coach

Roy Kidd, who is in his 19th season as head coach of the Colonels, added another coaching milestone this season by directing his team to its first ever undefeated 10-win season.

Kidd, who has compiled a 144-55-6 record at ECU, became the OVC's all-time winningest coach in 1980 and was also named National Coach of the Year 1-AA football for 1980 and 1981 for leading his Colonels to consecutive national championship contests.

Noteworthy coaching achievements have become a rule of thumb for Kidd during the last three years. In 1978, he was credited with his 100th collegiate coaching victory and, of course, in 1979 he guided the Colonels to the Division 1-AA national championship and school-record 11-win season.

During these past 19 years, Eastern has captured a national championship, two national runner-up trophies, five OVC championships, had an unbeaten string of 18 games in the league and won the 1967 NCAA Midwest Regional Championship (covering more than 100 teams in a 10-state area) by defeating Ball State 27-13 in the Grantland Rice Bowl.

Eastern has also been ranked in the top twenty in the nation having gone as high as No. 1 in 1979, 1981 and this season.

Kidd's success comes from a combination of demanding the ultimate in dedication and determination, yet being a coach who is respected by his players.

His ability to communicate with his players stems from a realistic, matter-of-fact attitude. He's genuinely concerned about each individual as a player and as a student.

He has a brilliant football mind and is a man who takes advantage of most situations and is not afraid to gamble. He is an organizer who has surrounded himself with a very capable coaching staff.

All these ingredients point to the fact that Roy Kidd is a winner. It all started for Kidd as a little leaguer in Corbin, Ky.,

and he continued on the plus side of the ledger as a high school athlete and then as a football and baseball star at Eastern.

When he was graduate assistant coach, Eastern went unbeaten and received an invitation to the Tangerine Bowl. Then he started coaching in high school, building tiny Richmond Madison into a state football powerhouse. He had a 54-10-1 record, a 27-game winning streak and 14 consecutive unscored-upon games. He was Kentucky Coach of the Year in 1961 when the Purples were ranked No. 1 in the state all season.

He went to Morehead as an assistant coach in 1962 and helped guide the Eagles to their second winning season in 13 years and a share of the OVC championship.

Then it was back to Eastern in 1963 where he served as an assistant for one year before taking over the head job.

The Colonels went 3-5-1 his first year, one of only two losing seasons he has had while coaching. They improved that to 5-3-1 the following year and Kidd was elected Coach of the Year in the OVC.

He is married to the former Susan Purcell of Richmond and they have three children.



1982 I-AA National Coach of the Year

John Merritt, Tennessee State Head Coach

If one man could exemplify that "Touch of Greatness" that is associated with TSU, that man would be John Merritt.

Merritt was born in 1926 in Falmouth, Kentucky. He attended Falmouth Elementary School and graduated from Central High School in Louisville, Kentucky. He graduated from Kentucky State College in 1950 and received a master of science degree from the University of Cincinnati. Merritt played prep football under Willie Kean, brother of Tennessee State's Henry Arthur "Fox" Kean, at Louisville Central and collegiate football at Kentucky State, five years after Fox Kean left that institution and moved to Tennessee State. As a Thoroughbred guard, Merritt won the Louisville Defender's All-American and All-Midwestern Conference honors for 1949 and played on the Kentucky State team that initiated the little brown jug classic game between the Thoroughbreds and Tigers.

This highly motivated and truly successful coach dominated and helped revolutionize football in the predominantly black colleges during the sixties and has continued at the top of the ladder in the seventies and eighties. During his 10-year college coaching stint at Jackson State University in Mississippi, Coach Merritt won the 1962 Coach of the Year honor while compiling a 60-33-4 record and having only one losing season. Merritt continued his winning philosophy at TSU when he left Jackson State in 1963 to take over the Tigers' head coach job.

"Big John," as he is affectionately known to his many friends and fans, is a man who loves challenges and hard work. He has shown an ability to bring a football team to maturity by making it realize its potential. As a result, he has been named Coach-of-the-Year more than a half-dozen times, while his teams have won National Championship honors among predominantly black colleges a like number of times. In 1979 his team won the National Black College

Championship after edging out his rival coaching counterpart, Eddie Robinson at Grambling. Last season the Tigers finished with a 9-3 record.

Since he came to Tennessee State in 1963, Merritt has not had a losing season. Under Merritt and his able staff of Joe Gilliam Sr. and Alvin "Cat" Coleman and others, TSU has amassed four undefeated seasons and six National Championships and a record of 155 wins, 31 losses and 5 ties for a winning percentage of 83.3 and a lifetime winning percentage of 76.02.

Coach Merritt's record of 215-64-9 makes him the third most winning coach just behind Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant from Alabama and Coach Eddie Robinson from Grambling. Coach Merritt has had several players to go to the pros and become big names in professional football.

Big John is married to the former Maxine Owens, who is the women's head basketball coach at TSU. They have a daughter, Mrs. Bonita Traugher of Chattanooga, Tennessee, and two grandsons, Merritt and Traugher.

Tie-Breaker Plan for NCAA Football Championships and OVC Regular Season Games

PROCEDURE FOLLOWING REGULATION PLAY. Immediately following the conclusion of the fourth quarter, officials shall instruct both teams to retire to their respective benches. The officials shall assemble on the 50-yard line and review these procedures. Without delay, the officials shall go directly to the team benches and escort the captains to the center of the field for the coin toss. The winner of the toss shall be given the option of selecting offense or defense for the first possession of the first overtime period and any subsequent odd-numbered periods. The loser of the toss shall have this option before all even numbered overtime periods.

BEGINNING THE OVERTIME. After the toss of a coin, a one-minute rest period shall be permitted. The referee shall select the goal at which the first overtime period shall be played. Team A shall receive the ball first-and-ten on their own 15-yard line. After Team A has had the ball for its series, whether it has scored or not, Team B becomes the offensive team with the ball on their own 15-yard line, first-and-ten.

NUMBER OF DOWNS. Each team shall have possession of the ball until it has scored or failed to gain a first-and-ten by either running out of downs or loss of possession through an intercepted pass or fumble. When a team scores either a field goal or touchdown, it gives

up possession of the ball following the attempted field goal or try for an extra point(s) following the touchdown.

PASS INTERFERENCE. Rules pertaining to offensive and defensive pass interference remain the same in the overtime period as during regulation play except as noted in the following situation... Team A commits offensive pass interference in Team B's end zone. Ruling: Team A is penalized 15 yards and charged with loss of down.

DEFENSE MAY NOT SCORE.

TIME-OUTS. Each team shall be allowed one time-out for each extra period.

FIELD GOALS. Field goals will count three points if successful.

SCORING. The team scoring the greater number of points after an equal number of possessions shall be declared the winner. The final score shall be the total of all points scored by each team during regulation and overtime periods.

ADDITIONAL PERIODS. If the score remains tied after an equal number of possessions, play will continue into an additional extra period(s).
