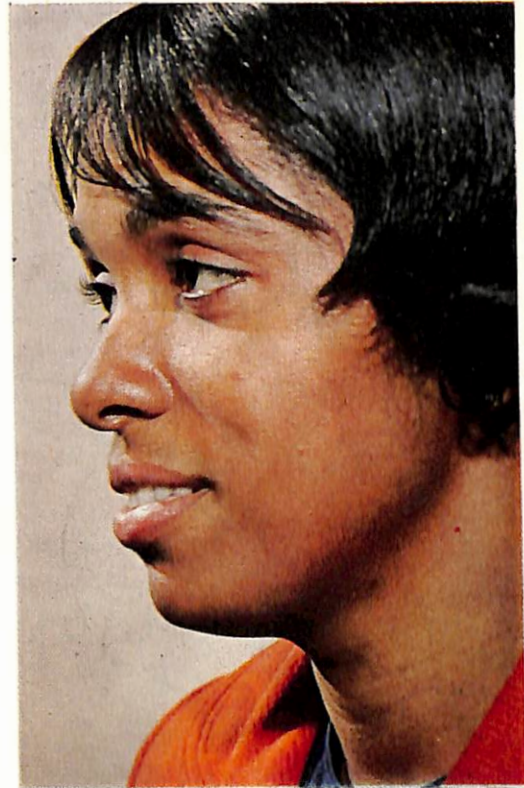

Student Council Proclamation

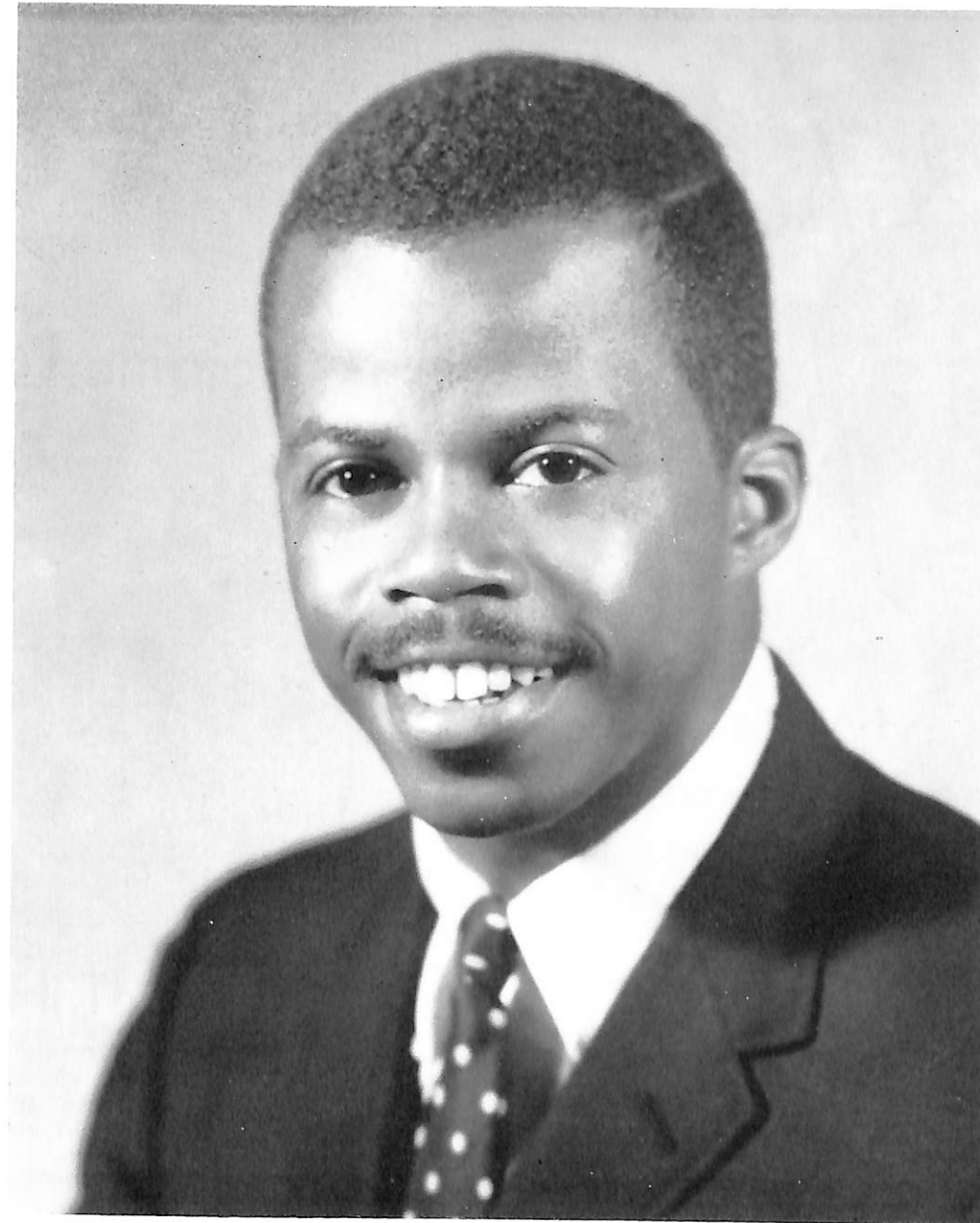

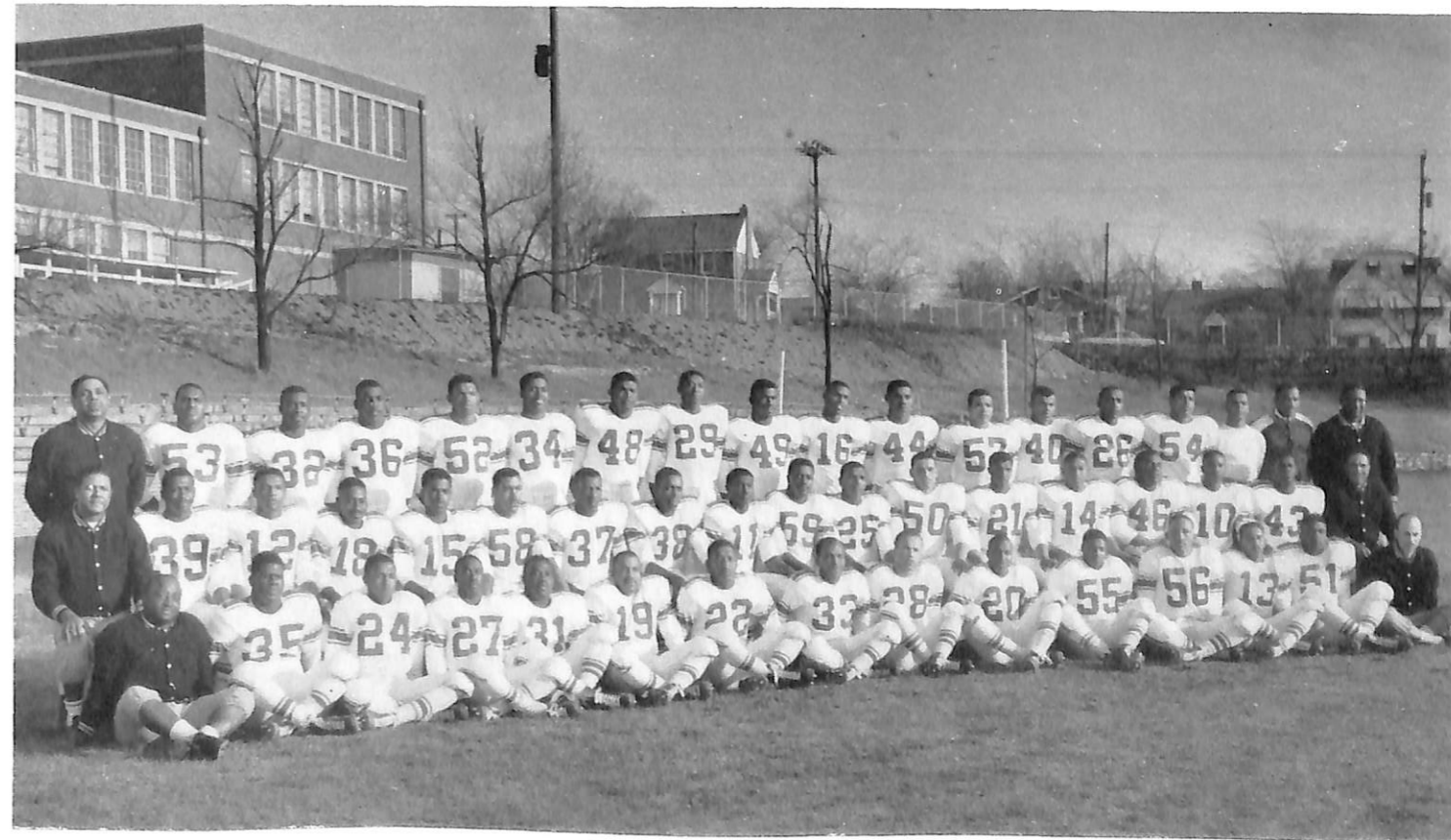
Tigerbelles' first Olympic medals were won in the 1956 Olympic Games at Melbourne, Australia by Willie B. White, Margaret Matthews, Mae Faggs, Wilma Rudolph, Lucinda Williams and Isabelle Daniels.

Now I know what they mean when they say that Tennessee State is a "Fountainhead for champions." Since 1956, when I was a little girl, there has been a steady stream of champion athletes pouring from this University (soon to be my alma mater) just like water gushing from a beautiful fountain. As a matter of fact, even before '56 they tell me the champs were here, but since this is 1966, and since 1956 Tennessee State athletic teams were the ones who first made the world sit up and take notice by breaking into the inner circle of athletic competition where race, creed, and color are afterthoughts, and since 10 years makes a nice round number, let's just think about the accomplishments of the 1956 Tennessee State University champs for a little while. . . .

The female track team was dubbed the "Tigerbelles" way back in the fifties which was a long time ago. The '56 team was one of the best. Even I remember the names of Isabelle Daniels, Mae Faggs, Willie B. White, Margaret Matthews, Lucinda Williams and the one and only Wilma "Skeeter" Rudolph, and would you believe, their coach was the same Ed Temple who is the coach of the 1966 Tigerbelle team of which I am a proud member! Imagine, he's been here all that time! These 1956 Tigerbelles were well-known even before Tennessee State became famous with their world-shaking feats in the 1960 Olympics.



Now, let me see, who is there to remember from the 1956 football team? There were so many "Mr. Wonderfals" that year, but the sportswriters wrote a lot about "Mr. Outside and Mr. Inside" (Percy Hines and Jesse Wilburn), Leon Jamison, Lee Derricks, Fay Mitchell, Charles Gavin and Andy Earthman, to name only a few from that fabulous bunch. The team built a three-year record without a loss and a lot of gridiron records that crew made have stood until this year's team came along. I think a couple of Fay Mitchell's records are still standing and Jesse Wilburn's kick-off return record remains. The squad was coached by our present athletic director whose name is Howard C. Gentry! All of the teachers on the campus, who were here during that time, still talk about how well the fellows on that team, as a whole, did academically. Well, really, for instance, they like to point with pride to Wilbur Suesberry who is now a physician, Charles Walker, who has a Ph.D. and is a college professor, and Arthur Higgs, who is now a practicing dentist. They also like to point out to you that any number of the members of that 1956 football team now hold the master's degree and are doing all right as individuals just like they did as a team.

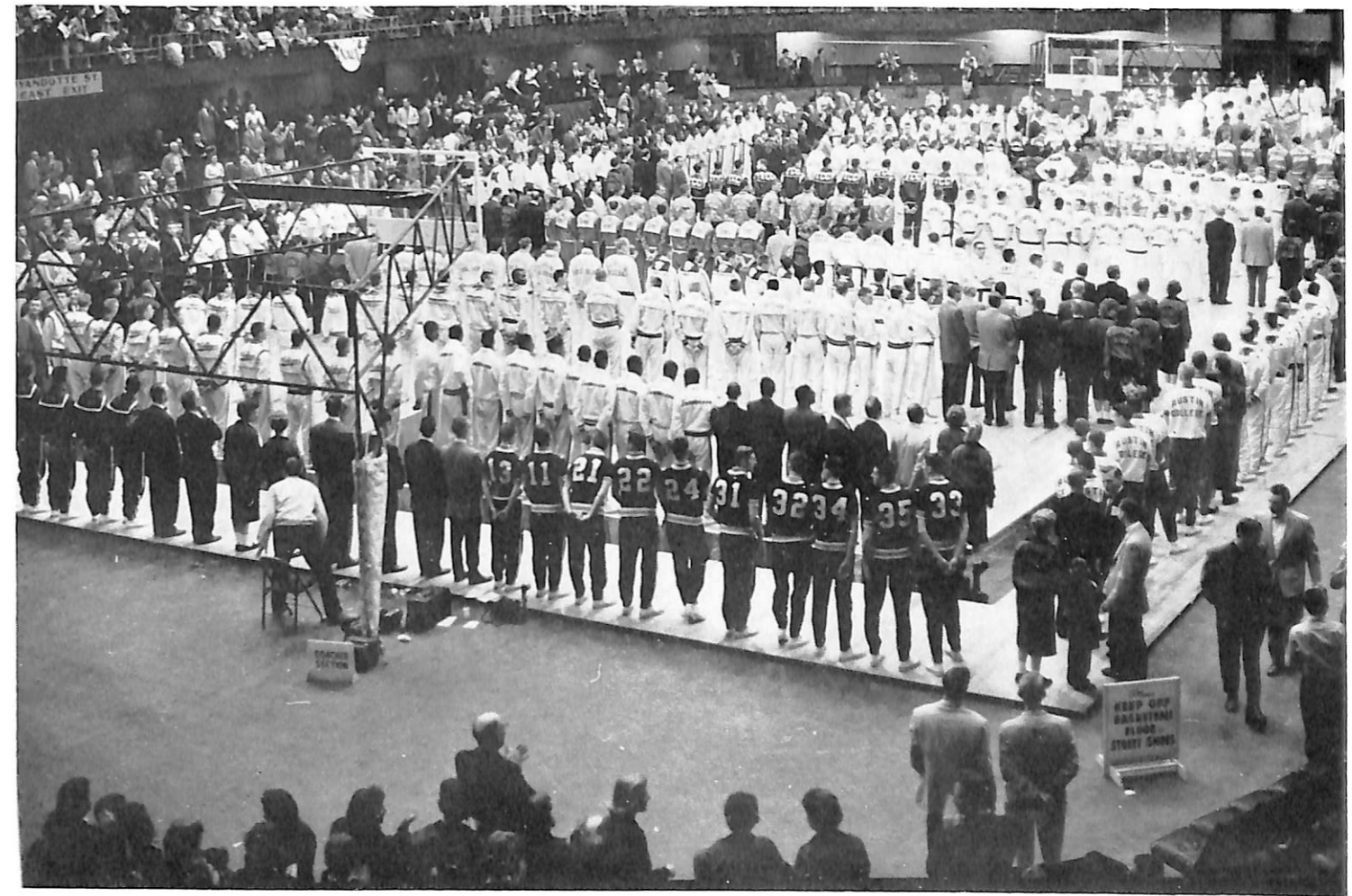

Tiger collegiate cagers broke the nation's basketball tourney color bar when they played in the 1952 NAIA playoff, but it took the 1956-57 whiz-kids to pull off the history-making play for the NAIA's James A. Naismith trophy.

And I guess everybody knows about Tennessee State's 1956 basketball team. They started the onslaught of year-in-year-out championships in the NAIA Tournament. In Panama, where I was growing up, the names Richard "Skull" Barnett and Coach Johnny McLendon were household words. And I'll always remember the number, "35" because that was Skull's jersey number and it was retired after Barnett finished his years of eligibility with the team. That was the first time I had ever heard of anything like that! About that time Tennessee State was becoming internationally known and in the Paraiso Canal Zone (where I grew up) everybody checked the wire services for Tennessee State basketball rankings among the small colleges. Barnett, John Barnhill and several other members of that memorable 1956 team are presently making names for themselves in the pro basketball world.



Thrills

Championship play has always produced thrills and the teams of a decade ago created spine-tingling moments that will be rehashed whenever sportsfans meet.

Margaret Matthews forecast thrills to come by becoming the first American woman to leap 19 feet in the AAU outdoor national championships and moved the American women's long jump record to 20 feet during the Olympic tryouts to win a berth on the U. S. Olympic team along with five of her team mates. The University got a greater thrill when the news was flashed from Australia that Tigerbelles Faggs, Matthews, Rudolph and Daniels won bronze medals in the 400 meter relay.

In one of football's greatest offensive shows, Gentry's eleven kept 42,000, 1956 Orange Blossom fans hanging until the final minute with a see-saw, two-point victory. And few cage fans will ever forget the 71-70 quarter-final squeaker against Pacific Lutheran that paved the way for the School's first NAIA championship. Trailing 69-70, Skull Barnett hit the strings on a 30-foot jumper with 10 seconds left in the game and Barnhill's and Hamilton's airtight defense kept the Lutes from crossing the 10-second line before the clock ran out.

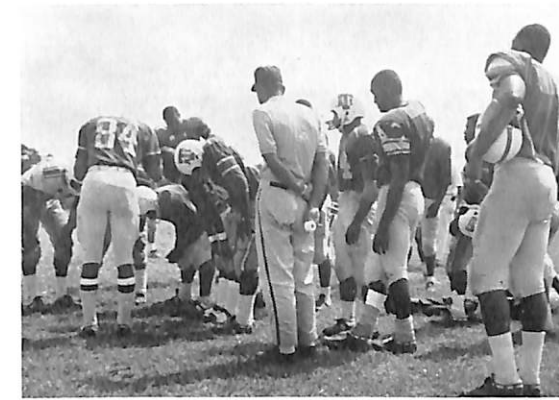

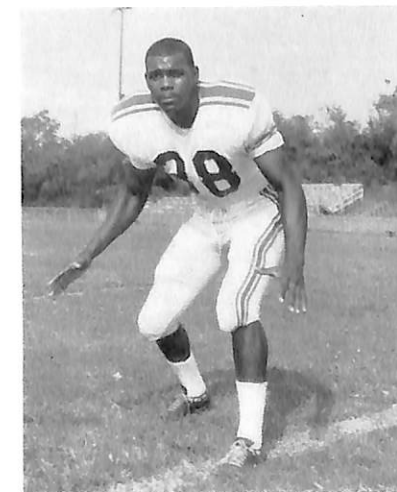
