HOWARD C. GENTRY Director of Intercollegiate and Intramural Athletics

Professor of Health, Physical Education and Recreation

A native of Columbus, Ohio, where he starred as a three-letter man in football, basketball, and track, Gentry played college football at Florida A. & M. under Big Bill Bell and the fabulous Jake Gaither. As a college professor, he made All-SIAC, and All-America as a tackle.

Following coaching stints at North Carolina A. & T., and Central State University, he joined the Tennessee State University coaching staff in 1949 as head line coach under the late Henry Arthur Kean

In 1955, he succeeded Kean as head coach. During his brief coaching career, he amassed a total of 42 wins, 10 losses and 1 tie. He won a National Championship in 1956 when he was named coach of the year. His teams won the Midwest Championship 3 times.

Mr. Gentry was elevated to the office of Director of Athletics in 1961, and immediately became active in the affairs of the NCAA. Currently, he is a member of the NCAA Council, and is Secretary to the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics.



JOHN MERRITT Head Coach

"Big John," as he is affectionately called, is entering his 19th season as a college head coach. During this time he has experienced but one losing season. Five times Merritt has been selected as Coach-ofthe-Year by both the Pittsburgh Courier and the 100 Percent Wrong Club of Atlanta, Georgia. This highly motivated, highly successful coach has dominated and revolutionized football in the predominantly black colleges throughout the decade of the 60's. During his eight-year reign at TSU, his Tiger juggernauts have amassed three National Championships, three undefeated seasons and a won-lost record of 65-11-4; seventy-nine of his former players have been drafted by the Pros. While Merritt is a master organizer and problem-solver, he still manages to find time to fill numerous speaking engagements. Holder of a Master's degree, he has done further study at the University of Cincinnati.

JOE W. GILLIAM Assistant Head Coach and Director of Defense



Gilliam leads the tough-relentless Tiger defenses which are among the best in the nation year in and year out. A sound fundamentalist and disciplinarian, Joe has the reputation of turning out "finished products" for the professional ranks. In the last five years Gilliam has the distinction of sending two entire defensive secondary units into the professional ranks. Joe has authored numerous articles concerning football and is a sought-after lecturer at football clinics. Gilliam holds the Master's degree with further work at the University of Kentucky.

J. C. COFFEE **Defensive Interior Line Coach**

One of the most well-liked persons in the coaching fraternity, "Ole Buddy" is a driving, demanding coach who possesses superior knowledge of body leverage and mechanics and is widely known for his "jack-of-all-trades" abilities. Coffee has a rich and varied background as both a player and a coach. In recent years he has specialized in the art of tackling. "Ole Buddy" is an outstanding teacher both in and out of the classroom. Coffee holds the Master's degree in Health, Physical Education and Recreation.





"Cat" is the senior member of this tremendously successful coaching staff. A scientist by training, he attacks football with this same calculating, logically sound approach. Coleman was one of the very first college coaches to use the Pro-type offensive alignments as his basic offense; today, over a decade later "Cat" has few peers at developing a passing game; quiet, dedicated and fiercely competitive Coleman has spent over a quarter of a century in college education; "Cat" has a Master's degree from the University of Michigan with additional study toward his terminal degree.

"Chump" is probably the most consistently successful recruiter in the business today. It is through his diserning eye that the TSU roster is talent-laddened year after year. As a recruiter "Little Does a Lot with a Little." The fact the Tigers are hardly, if ever caught flat-footed is largely due to Shannon's premier scouting ability; however, his talents and duties do not stop here. JIMMY BRADFORD - 5-10, 180 pound Safety from Nashville, Tenn. A headsup performer who has been a regular for two years. A real team man who has a steadying influence on younger players. Jimmy is a senior MAJOR: History.

CLIFFORD BROOKS - 6-1, 203 pound Cornerback from Lufkins, Texas. Was the only two-way performer on last year's squad when he turned in magnificent performances, both as a defensive back and as backup quarterback. A senior this season, Brooks is noted for his fierce, aggressive play. Has never given up TD pass. A prime object of Pro scouts. All-America candidate.

MAJOR: Business Administration.

NATHANIEL BROWN-6-2, 256 Offensive Tackle from New Orleans. Brown, a senior, is high on the list of pro scouts who have been following his performances over the years. Big, strong and aggressive; a tremendous pass blocker, and a vicious blocker in the ground game. He's Offensive Cocaptain.

MAJOR: Sociology.

WAYMOND BRYANT-6-3, 237 pound Mackman and strong Linebacker from Dallas, Texas. Waymond, a Sophomore, won a starting berth last year as a frosh on a veteran team. Put in more playing time than any other defensive lineman on squad last season. Because of his speed and quickness, he's poison against the run.

MAJOR: Health and Physical Education.

ST. CLAIR COLEMAN-6-3, 267 pound Defensive Tackle from New Orleans. A Redshirt Freshman, St. Clair had a weight problem last season when he reported to camp with a weight of 323. At his present weight, he's showing greater quickness and stamina. MAJOR: Health and Physical Education.

GEORGE CRAWFORD-6-3, 255 pound Junior Offensive Guard from Nashville. George could be a major factor in the Tigers' offensive line. This steady and competent ball player with his fine backup work, could easily become a regular with the "Magnificent Seven."

MAJOR: History.



DENNIS JACKSON - 6-0, 205 pound Strong Side Linebacker from Mt. Juliet, Tenn. A Sophomore, Dennis comes from the speciality team to fill this important spot. Much of the '71 team's success will depend on his ability to handle this spot. Must improve tackling technique in a hurry. Has great speed for a linebacker.

MAJOR: Health and Physical Education.

JESSE JAMES-6-2, 235 Senior Offensive Guard from Ocala, Florida, has been a backup lineman for two years. A knee injury spoiled his starting debut last season, but he looked sharp in the spring drills. He blocks linebackers as well as the best. Seldom misses an assignment. Gunning for starting berth this season. Is a brilliant scholar.

MAJOR: Health and Physical Education.

JAMES JOHNSON - 6-2, 210 pound Cornerback and Safety from Memphis, is a Redshirt Freshman. James had a fair spring practice. Has unusual ability to accelerate once ball is in flight. Can be an important cog if he once develops necessary endurance to play collegiate football.

MAJOR: Health and Physical Education.

EDWARD JONES - 6-8, 248 pound Junior Defensive End and Tackle from Jackson, Tenn., is the most improved defensive player on the squad. During the winter months, Ed doubles as a center on the TSU Basketball Team. Has amazing quickness and agility for a tall man. Strong and getting stronger; good and getting better. MAJOR: Biology.

GREGORY KINDLE - 6-5, 245 pound Sophomore Offensive Tackle from Dallas, Texas, is called, "The Texas Darling" by Coach Merritt. Gregory is a deadly blocker with quick feet, and has the potentials to become the best all-around offensive lineman the school has ever produced. He has been a starter since he first joined the team. Seen as a sure-shot for the Pros. MAJOR: Industrial Arts Education.

FRED LANE-5-11, 194 pound Setback from Franklin, Tenn. Fred, a Junior, has a wealth of talents. He started the last three games last season. A very intelligent runner, he can run back punts and kickoffs in fine style. Has great quickness; should be one of starters at Setback posts.

JAMES LEWIS-5-11, 170 pound Redshirt Freshman Safety from Memphis. An intelligent performer, who is learning to get the jump on the ball. Possesses fine hands for a youngster. Once he learns to minimize his mistakes, he could be of great help to the Big Blue cause this fall. MAJOR: Mathematics.

GRANVILLE LYONS, III — 6-2, 185 pound Redshirt Freshman from Nashville. Started fast in spring drills, but conditioning became a problem. Plays either Cornerback or Safety. Has good speed and fine football sense. His tackling must improve in order to challenge for a starting role. MAJOR: Health and Physical Education

LARRY MALLORY-5-10 1/2, 175 pound Safety from Memphis. Larry, a Redshirt Freshman, is highly intelligent and makes good decisions on the field. Must improve executions on pass coverage and his willingness to come up and tackle from his secondary position. Has fine potentials. MAJOR: Business Administration.

JOHN McWILLIAMS-6-1, 250 pound Junior Offensive Guard from Dallas, Texas, is rated as a super-star, and one of the finest of "The Magnificent Seven." He's a natural; pulls well, sets up very quickly, fast feet, and can play three positions on offense. A converted center, he can hold his own at that position.

MAJOR: Industrial Arts.

CHARLES McTORRY-6-0, 197 pound Junior Cornerback from Jackson, Miss., was a part-time starter in 1970 until he suffered a shoulder dislocation. An assortment of other injuries have hampered his career. Seems to be in fine shape for forthcoming season. Forces well on runs, and is most experienced defensive back on squad. MAJOR: Health and Physical Education.

RILEY MOORE-6-4, 239 pound Outside Linebacker from Houston, Texas, was a starter for a while last year, but lost the role before the season was over. Must recover from finger dislocation in spring to regain previous form. A Sophomore, Riley has the ability to come up with the "big play."

MAJOR: Industrial Arts Education.

CHARLES THOMAS - 5-6. 182 pound Setback from Houston, Texas. Charlie, a Senior, is loaded with talent. He has fine balance and a pair of excellent hands. Injuries have hampered him each year and there is a feeling that he needs to improve his stamina. Barring injuries, he should be one of the key runners for the Big Blue this season.

MAJOR: Health and Physical Education.

CHARLES WADE - 5-10, 164 pound Wide Receiver has blazing speed. Charles, a Junior, has been clocked as the fastest man on the squad. His speed should help the Tigers make up for the loss of the great David Davis, Joe Scales and Joe Sweet. Charles is a definite challenger for a starting role. MAJOR: Health and Physical Education.

JIM WALKER Head Coach

Win football games-that's what a new college coach is hired to do. How fast he wins usually depends on how far down things are when he takes over. But Jim Walker is an exception to that rule. His first Central State football team posted a 5-3 record in 1969, only one victory shy of the total games won by the last three Marauder squads combined.

Seventeen defeats had spotted the record of the 1966-67-68 Central State football teams with only six victories to salve the wounds when Walker stepped up from his job as head line coach to take the helm of the Marauders' ship.

How did he do it? Things called team spirit and pride helped a lot, along with a belief by the players that their head coach and his staff were with them come feast or famine. It was a feeling, more than anything else, a feeling that the Marauders had gotten it all together-they were a team.

Walker, a quiet man who radiates a quiet but unmistakable control over practices and games, hired two new coaches for a start, men who had played with the Marauders when they were winners. Andy Bibbs and Norman Ward, both former star runners at CSU, along with holdover Bob Steele, talked winning until the 19-15 victory over Maryland State in the season opener convinced the players they could do the job.

Being on top is a perennial thing with Walker. His first stint as head coach at CSU lasted nine years (1957-65) and produced a 40-29-3 reecord. In 10 years as the Marauders' line coach (1947-57) Walker molded front lines that carried Central State to national football prominence and produced Bowl champions three times.

Jack Dempsey's Physical Fitness program beckoned to Walker after he joined the Coast Guard and he spent two years in the project headed by the former world heavyweight boxing champion.

Walker earned his Master's degree at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, and holds the rank of Assistant Professor of Health, Physical Education and Recreation at Central State.

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He was head line coach for three seasons (1966-68) under Tom Stephenson and succeeded Stephenson when the former Xenia High School coach left CSU in the spring of 1969 to become Athletic Director of the Fairborn (O.) school system.

Walker was an All-State football and basketball player at Washington High School in South Bend, Ind., and two years after graduation he was a starting offensive tackle for Dr. Eddie Anderson's Iowa Hawkeyes.

The 1942 college football season is remembered in the Big Ten as "The Year of the Tackle" and Walker was selected on the Big Ten and All-America teams. An early selection for the 1942 College All-Star football game with the Chicago Bears, Walker got in his licks in a losing battle with the fabled "Monsters of the Midway."

In 1947 Walker arrived at Central State to start what has become a 23-year association with the school. His keen knowledge of football line play is known throughout the college game, and he numbers among his friends the top names in the professional and amateur's grid ranks
