CLINICAL OR COUNSELING?

Practically speaking, there is little difference between what Counseling and Clinical Psychologists do. Both are eligible for the same license to practice as a psychologist. Both have the credentials to be hired by colleges and universities to work as professors. Both are required to complete original research in the form of a dissertation prior to earning their doctorate.

One major difference is that Clinical Psychology PhD programs tend to be significantly more competitive to get into and tend to be somewhat more research focused. Clinical Psychology also tends to be more squarely focused on psychological disorders, whereas Counseling Psychology also examines problems with everyday life and positive psychology.
