



### **Tobacco Use Among Youth**

- The last five years have seen enormous spikes in youth ecigarette use rates.
- In 2019, 27.5% of high school students had used e-cigarettes in the past month.



# Why are E-cigarettes Attractive to Youth?

- Fashionable/Stylish
- Accessibility
- Advertising
- Belief that they are safer than cigarettes
- Easy to hide from teachers and parents









Regulates and enforces how tobacco products are made and sold



Illegal to sell tobacco products to those under the age of 21






### TN Tobacco Control Report


#### **Tennessee's Grades:**

- Funding for State Tobacco Prevention Programs – Grade F
- Strength of Smoke-free Workplace Laws -Grade D
- Level of State Tobacco Taxes Grade F
- Coverage and Access to Services to Quit Tobacco - Grade F
- Minimum Age of Sale for Tobacco Products to 21 – Grade F

- The Lung Association encourages
   Tennessee to put in place all the public policies called for in "State of Tobacco Control.":
  - Updating the legal sales age of tobacco products and establishing retail licensure, inspections, and penalties for violations;
  - Establishing a tax on e-cigarettes equivalent to the current tax on combustible cigarettes; and
  - Increasing funding for tobacco prevention and control programs.




### Health Effects of Tobacco Use

- E-cigarette or Vaping Associated Lung Injury (EVALI)
- Nicotine is highly addictive, can affect developing brain in youth
- Cancer
- Heart disease
- Stroke
- Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), emphysema and bronchitis
- Increases Coronavirus severity

### Deaths from Tobacco Use in TN



11,000

Adults who die each year from their own smoking



Kids now under 18 and alive in Tennessee who will ultimately die prematurely from smoking



Smoking-Caused Monetary Costs in Tennessee	
Annual health care costs in Tennessee directly caused by smoking	\$2.67 billion
Medicaid costs caused by smoking in Tennessee	\$823.6 million
Residents' state & federal tax burden from smoking-caused government expenditures	\$974 per household
Smoking-caused productivity losses in Tennessee	\$3.59 billion

# Financial Burden of Tobacco Use


### Financial Burden of Tobacco Use

- Tennessee received \$422
  million (estimated) in revenue
  from tobacco settlement
  payments and taxes in fiscal
  year 2019.
- Of this, the state allocated \$0 in state funds to tobacco prevention in fiscal year 2019, which is 0% of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's annual spending target.






## Tobacco Active Facilities in Davidson County, TN






### Drive Time to Tobacco Active Facilities






### Drive Time to Tobacco Active Facilities by Age Group






### Drive Time to Tobacco Active Facilities by Vulnerable Communities






## Drive Time to Tobacco Active Facilities by Diversity Index





# Conclusions & Recommendations



## Conclusions



High percent of Active Tobacco Retailers located within Davidson County Tennessee



Majority of the vulnerable portion of the community, uneducated, low-income, minority and Hispanic resides within easy geographic access (less than 3 minutes' drive) to the active tobacco facilities (stores)



High population of millennial and generation Z age group located within 0-3 minutes driving time to tobacco active facilities.




The high diversity reveals that the active tobacco facilities (stores) are located within an easy geographically accusable (less than 3 minutes' drive) location to the most diversified communities.



## Recommendations

- Limit proximity of retailers to schools by geographic area
- Limit proximity of retailers to retailers to decrease overall density
- Enact and enforce policy restrictions to prevent new retailers from opening within a 1,000 feet of vulnerable communities.
- Establish a tax on e-cigarettes
- Increase e-cigarette cessation programs for youth
